An imposing funeral took place yesterday when George Namokueha, a member of the police force, was carried to his last resting place. Many Hawaiian societies attended the funeral, which marched from the undertaking parlors to the grave in the Kaunakapili churchyard.

Among the societies were the Hui OIwi, and the woman's auxiliary of the OIwi, the Hui Kookoa, the Poolas and the Poola wahines. An escort of foot-police walked in the procession, which was preceded by the Hawaiian band.

REPORTED CHINA HAS WITHDRAWN

TOKIO, Aug. 8.—It is now believed here that China has withdrawn whatever objection she may have raised to the standardizing of the Antung-Mukden railway line, and that the construction will be carried on without friction.

ATHENS, Aug. 8.—It is expected that Greece will reply to Turkey on Tuesday. The representatives of the Powers and the Premier have been closeted together in conference frequently of late.

THE BRITISH steamer Century, Captain D. A. Downie, bringing 5000 tons of coal and 400 bags of manure for local business houses, arrived yesterday afternoon from Newcastle and docked at the Channel wharf, where she is discharging her cargo. She made the trip in nineteen days, experiencing rather pleasant weather. From here she will proceed to San Francisco and the South. The Century is one of several fine steamers of the Howard Smith Company of Melbourne. She has fine passenger accommodations. A few passengers came on her to visit Honolulu. The officers of the steamer wear gold-braided uniforms, which are seldom seen here.

THE PACIFIC MAIL steamer Siberia, Captain Zeeder, called for San Francisco yesterday morning from the Hackfeld wharf. Owing to the departure of many prominent people for the mainland, the wharf was crowded with relatives and friends. Among the passengers were Lieutenant Commander Moses, who is well known here, Mrs. Moses accompanied him.

THE MATSON liner Hihonua, Captain Fredericksen, leaves tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock for San Francisco. She will take a good-sized list of passengers and a full load of sugar, pineapples and other island products. The band will, as usual, play before she leaves.

THE PACIFIC MAIL liner Korea, Captain Sandberg, is due to arrive from San Francisco on Wednesday morning. It is expected that she will bring a large number of passengers for Honolulu. She will probably call in the afternoon at 5 o'clock for the Orient.

THE STEAMER Mauna Kea leaves at noon tomorrow for Maui ports and Hilo. She takes passengers, mail and general cargo. In the afternoon at 5 o'clock, the Kilauea calls for Kaula while the Mikahala, which sails at the same time, departs for Molokai and Maui.

THE OCEANIC liner Alameda, Captain Powell, will come in from San Francisco next Friday morning probably at 7 o'clock. She will probably be heard from by wireless tomorrow night.
