REVISE ITINERARY OF CONGRESSMEN

Committee Finds That There Is No Response to Suggestion That Homes Be Opened to the Visitors.

With the Delegate to Congress in the chair the executive committee charged with the duty of arranging the reception of the Congressional party held a meeting in the office of Governor Frear yesterday afternoon. Among those present from the other islands were H. P. Baldwin and Editor Coke of the Maui News and they made several recommendations in regard to the Maui itinerary. As now arranged the steamer will reach Hana at 6 o'clock on Sunday morning when those who desire to take the sixty-mile ride along the Koolau dike to Makawao will be started on their journey. The steamer will then go to Kahului and leave Lahaina at 10 o'clock Monday night for Honolulu. During the interval the members of the party will lead something resembling the strenuous life for the program provides for a trip to the summit of Haleakala, to be entertained at Punene and a trip to Iao valley.

On the suggestion of Prince Kuhio the members of the party who are to make the Hamakua trip will land at Mahukona at 12:30 in the morning, a portion of the party going on to Kona to leave at 9 o'clock in the morning and going direct to Hilo.

The committee found that there was nothing approaching a generous response to the suggestion that Honolulu open their homes to the visiting Congressmen. It seems that the only reply has been from Mr. Lewis asking that Congressman Bates be his guest but a perusal of the revised list of the delegation shows that Congressman Bates' name is not there.

E. A. Mott-Smith made a motion that the transportation committee have authority in connection with the inter-island transportation of the visitors.

Kanal's request for a slice of \$500 from the appropriation for the entertainment was cut to \$300 on the motion of W. O. Smith, the members of the committee not being able to see how Kanal was going to use \$500.

Announcement of appointments were made by Chairman Kuhio, W. F. Dillingham, chairman of the entertainment committee and G. J. Walker and John C. Lane as the other members. T. H. Petrie is chairman of the committee on transportation, the other members being J. M. Dowsett and H. Wichman. Action on the suggestion of having R. K. Bonine accompany the party as the official photographer was deferred on the suggestion of W. O. Smith, who stated that the cost should be ascertained before anything definite was done.

CREE ASKS FOR ROAD REPAIRS

Major Cree, in command of Fort Ruger, has written Mayor Fern the following letter in regard to improving the condition of the roads leading to the camp:

Honolulu, T. H., Aug. 20, 1909. To the Honorable Mayor and Members of the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of Honolulu:

Gentlemen—I have the honor to invite your attention to the fact that by order of the President of the United States a body of Coast Artillery troops has recently been sent to garrison Fort Ruger, situated a short distance north of Diamond Head.

The land in the immediate vicinity of the reservation is, in a large part, as yet unimproved, and the roads leading to the camp site are in such bad condition that they are almost impassable. They are so bad as to make travel by automobile impossible, and the merchants of the city refuse to deliver goods to the camp for this reason.

In order that the troops of the garrison may have reasonable access to the reservation I respectfully request that the following streets be put in condition for service:

1. The diagonal street running in front of Z. K. Meyers place (Reservoir street), should be macadamized.
2. From the end of this street to Leahi Home, open and improve Kilauea avenue and Makapuu Avenue.
3. Thence open and improve Makapuu avenue to Diamond Head road.

This will give convenient egress from the camp in the direction of both of the lines of trolley cars running in this direction, and will be of benefit not only to the garrison of this post, but to the property holders in this vicinity and to the merchants of Honolulu who deliver goods to the reservation.

EMPLOYEES MUST DIG UP TAXES

Tax Assessor Charles T. Wilder has addressed a letter to the Mayor, giving him a list of employees in the City and County who have become delinquent in the payment of their taxes. It reads:

Honolulu, August 21, 1909. Hon. Joseph J. Fern, Mayor of the City and County of Honolulu.

Dear Sir:—I beg to hand you here-with a list of persons in the employ of the City and County of Honolulu who have allowed their taxes to remain unpaid, although repeatedly requested to settle them. In some instances the amount shown covers the taxes due for a period of several years.

I have taken the matter up with several of the Territorial department heads and they will advise the members of their clerical force that the prompt payment of the taxes due by them will be one of the conditions under which they may hope to hold their positions in the department.

Believing this to be a reasonable demand, I would most respectfully ask that you adopt this principle with persons holding appointive positions under the City and County government, and, further, that you use your authority with such persons to bring about an early settlement of the taxes now due by them.
