In addition to the \$200 which the  
Board of Supervisors appropriated  
last night to aid Mayor Fern's luau  
fund, the Territory has assured His  
Honor of a substantial contribution,  
so that with an emergency fund of  
\$500 to draw on, the proposition  
will turn out better financially for  
the Mayor than he first figured. In  
fact, he now has in sight enough  
money to nearly cover all of the ex-  
penses, although he assumed the re-  
sponsibility personally at first.
