FILIPINOS COME ON LINER ASIA

Passengers Experience Hot Weather During The Trip

During the first two days out from Yokohama, the passengers of the steamship Asia, which arrived this morning from the Orient, experienced very hot weather. The officers say they never saw anything like it before.

The Asia docked at the Hackfeld wharf this morning shortly after 8 o'clock, bringing thirty-two Filipinos to work on plantations. They were met at the wharf by R. D. Mead of the Planters' Association and conducted over to the Immigration Station.

There were sixty-seven saloon passengers, nine of whom were for Honolulu. Among the through passengers is C. E. Weir of the Southern Pacific line. He has been in Japan endeavoring to purchase ties for the company. J. J. Woodruff, former chief steward of the Coptic, is returning to the States, accompanied by his wife.

The Asia, which sailed this afternoon at 5 o'clock, brought forty-two bags of mail and about 800 tons of general cargo.

WIRELESS FROM PACIFIC FLEET

At 8 o'clock last night a wireless was received from the Pacific Fleet, at Kahuku Point. The fleet will probably arrive here on Friday. The ships are not making as great speed as was expected, and at the present rate will require about five and a half days to make the run from San Francisco. The message received last night from Sabro's fleet reads as follows: "Position, 8 p. m., latitude 34 degrees 43 minutes north; longitude 131 degrees 35 minutes west. Speed, 400 miles a day."

(Continued from Page 1) When the substitute ordinance came up for consideration Quinn and Aylott became involved in a discussion as to the propriety of the procedure followed in the introduction of the substitute measure but the difference of opinion did not provide anything like an explosion and was finally settled and the ordinance passed on first reading.

The substitute ordinance grants absolute power to the road overseer or engineer to exact a bond from all corporations or persons who are excavating in the public highways. Two sureties are to be required on the bond and it is intended to furnish protection to the responsible officials in the event of an accident occurring through the excavation in the public highways.

PEARY FOUND IT APRIL 6, 1909

NEW YORK, Sept. 6. — Captain Peary reached the North Pole on April 6, 1909. He will probably arrive at Chateau Bay Wednesday, when full details of his trip and observations will be telegraphed here. The captain of the Roosevelt telegraphs that no traces of Dr. Cook were found by the Peary party.

DR. COOK SAYS HE IS PLEASED

COPENHAGEN, Sept. 6. — This city was electrified today when the news was received that Captain Peary had succeeded in reaching the North Pole. Dr. Cook said: "This is good news, and I am glad, for Captain Peary's observations will confirm those made by me."

The King will confer the gold medal with the crown on Dr. Cook. This decoration has been worn on only by Nansen, Heidin and Amundsen. As high as \$200 has been offered for tickets to the lecture which Dr. Cook will deliver before the Geographical Society. The Geographical Society will bestow a medal upon the explorer.

MOST REMARKABLE INCIDENT IN HISTORY

LONDON, Sept. 6.—Great astonishment is expressed here at the fact that almost simultaneously with the return of Dr. Cook, after his successful dash for the pole, should come the message from Captain Peary, announcing the success of his latest endeavor.
