LOCAL NOTICE TO MARINERS. OFFICE OF THE ASSISTANCE TO THE INSPECTOR, 12th Light-House District, 311 McCandless Building, Honolulu, T. H., Sept. 16, 1909. The following affects the List of Lights and Fog Signals, Pacific Coast, 1908, page 72, No. 333 (List of Lights, Buoys and Daymarks, 12th Light-House Subdistrict, 1909, page 16).

HAWAII. MAKAPUU POINT LIGHT-STATION—Oahu Island—SE'ly Point.—On October 1, 1909, or as soon there after as practicable, there will be established at this station a hyper-radiant light, flashing white 7 1/2 seconds, eclipse 1 1/2 seconds, about 42 feet above high water and 25 feet above the ground, on a cement-gray cylindrical tower 20 feet in diameter at the base, surmounted by a hyper-radiant lantern with vertical posts and horizontal sash bars, painted black. The light will be visible from a vessel from 11 deg. true (N 1-16 E mag.) around by west and south to 123 deg. true (SE by E 15-16 E mag.)—obscured between 161 deg. true (SSE 9-16 E mag.) and 171 deg. true (S by E 11-16 E mag.) by Mauna Island. In clear weather the light should be visible at a distance of 28 miles, the observer's eye being 15 feet above sea level.

MILLION SMOKES ON MONGOLIA Cigars Going Through Free Of Duty On Board. One million happy smiles are going through on the Mongolia to San Francisco free of duty in the shape of one million cigars from the Philippines. With the Payne tariff law in effect, the Philippines get 150,000,000 cigars in free and this consignment starts the ball rolling.
