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COOK FAKER

ROBERTSON WILL BE INDORSED BY BAR

Local Attorneys Are Supporting His Candidacy

EXPECT LOCAL MAN WILL BE APPOINTED

Quick Retirement of Woodruff Believed to Militate Against Naming of Another Mainlander for Bench.

At the meeting of the Bar Association which has been called for 4 o'clock this afternoon, A. G. M. Robertson, it is practically certain, will be indorsed as a candidate for Second Federal Judge to succeed to the place on the United States District Court bench to be vacated by the approaching resignation of Judge Woodruff.

The sentiment among the members of the Association appears to be unanimous and no difficulty is apprehended this afternoon by the supporters of Robertson in carrying through a resolution reiterating the indorsement of the Robertson candidacy, first given when Congress passed the bill providing a second Federal Judge for the Territory of Hawaii.

Henry E. Cooper is an admitted contender for the place to be vacated by Woodruff and while he has a number of strong supporters in the membership of the Bar Association it is the opinion that the Association cannot go back of its first indorsement of Robertson even in the event of there being a changing sentiment, which there is not.

With the indorsement of the Bar Association back of him for the second time the appointment of Robertson is a practical certainty, according to the predictions of many interested in the lining up for the Federal Judgeship. The early retirement of Woodruff, before he had an opportunity of wearing the judicial ermine with ease, it is conceded, will militate against the appointment of another mainlander.

There is not much credence placed in the rumor that Woodruff's intention to resign was the sudden outcome of an offer from the Pocahontas Coal Company of New York. Gossip has naturally been busy with the reasons for Woodruff's sudden and unexpected decision one of the rumors being that his intention is mainly because of a feeling held by Mrs. Woodruff that Honolulu did not come up to her expectations or offer a pleasant, satisfactory place for a future home. The main criticism that has been directed against Woodruff is caused by the opinion that he did not come to the Territory and that his decision to resign came after he had an opportunity of looking over the situation and deciding that he would rather go with the Pocahontas Coal Company of New York than continue his brief labors as Second Judge of the United States Court of Hawaii.

(Special Bulletin Cable.) WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 9. — Blackburn has resigned from the Isthmian Commission.

CUT NAVY COAL MONEY WASHINGTON, Dec. 9. — Congressman Charles H. Cowles of North Carolina announced in the House today his intention of opposing the liberal appropriation for the coal supply of the navy. He proposes to reduce the appropriation for coal to be used by the navy one million of dollars. This will of course be vigorously contested by those who do not believe in a navy that spends all its time in port.

CALHOUN'S TRIAL DELAYED SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 9. — After the examination of talesmen for the retrial of Patrick Calhoun for bribery had proceeded two days, the trial against the president of the United Railways was today again postponed until Jan. 10, 1910. This means that the prosecution of the case will be continued or discontinued by the officers of the new city administration.

MONEY LEADS DEMOCRATS WASHINGTON, Dec. 9. — Senator H. D. Money of Mississippi was today selected as the leader of the Democratic forces in the Senate, succeeding Senator Culberson of Texas, who has been the sockman for the minority on all the main party issues.

YELLOW FLAG ON TENYO MARU

NEW AMBASSADOR OF THE MIKADO ON TENYO

Takahira's Successor Is On Way To Washington

HAS HAD LONG DIPLOMATIC TRAINING

Baron Yasuza Uchida Will Take Up Question of New Treaty With the State Department at Washington.

Having in his hands a marine glass with which he looked at Japanese Consul General Uyeno and his secretaries sitting in Admiral Rees's launch, off port, the new Japanese ambassador to Washington, Baron Yasuza Uchida, arrived from Japan on the Tenyo Maru at noon today, and was delayed in coming ashore, on account of a suspicious case which the local quarantine officials found among the passengers.

The Baron, who was anxious to meet Consul General Uyeno, stood by the steamer's railing and waited for the completion of the examination by the health officials of the Federal Government. Dr. H. C. Hobdy, chief of the quarantine service here, who did not go out in the quarantine launch, had to be sent for in order that he might make a personal examination of the patient.

Beside the pilot, Captain Saunders and Dr. Ramus and others of the quar-

antine service, no one, including the customs and immigration officials, were permitted to go on board the Tenyo Maru.

Baron Uchida, one of the rising young diplomats of Japan, has been in the diplomatic service for many years. He received his first appointment in 1887, when he went to the Japanese embassy in Washington as a secretary. From there he was made a secretary of the Japanese embassy at London. In 1897, he went to Peking, remaining there until 1906, when he was made a vice minister of the Department of Foreign Affairs. In 1906 he was appointed Japanese Minister in Vienna, holding that position until Baron Takahira, Minister to Washington, was recalled to Japan.

Should the Baron, accompanied by his wife, be able to come ashore today, he will be entertained by Consul General Uyeno at his residence to-night. This afternoon, the distinguished guests will be taken around to see points of interest.

Among the passengers who arrived today on the Tenyo is Dr. I. Katsuki who has been visiting his parents in Japan. Mr. Kanai, manager of the Japanese Rice Mill, also returned from a business trip to Japan.

COOK RECORD FAKED

NEW YORK, Dec. 9. — Captain August Loose and George Dunkie, who were supposed to have accompanied Explorer Cook to the North Pole, made sworn statements today to the effect that they faked the records presented in their name to prove that Dr. Cook reached the North Pole in advance of Commander Peary.

These men tell a straight story of their work and claim that they have now exposed the whole scheme because they have not been paid by Dr. Cook and his associates as promised.

These statements have created a profound sensation, and taken in connection with the affidavits that Dr. Cook never reached the top of mount McKinley, they combine to prove the much advertised explorer to be one of the monumental fakers of the century. Peary and his friends have doubted the authenticity of Dr. Cook's claims from the first.

Blow On Dr. Cook

(Special Bulletin Cable.) NEW YORK, Dec. 9. — Loose and Dunkie have made affidavits to the effect that Explorer Cook hired them for \$4,000 with a promise of \$500 more, to assist him in faking up the North Pole discovery. They give facsimile statements and details as are contained in Cook's memorandum, including directions and observations.

THIRTEEN MISSING

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Dec. 9. — The steamer Clarion was burned today. Two of her ship's company are known to have been drowned and thirteen of the crew are missing.

TURNCOAT DOCTOR ACCUSES MANY

GET TOGETHER FOR HONOLULU'S BENEFIT

Sermon on Promotion Is Preached by Sec'y Cooper

Secretary Cooper in his weekly letter to the Promotion Committee, writes as follows:

I should like to have your consideration and opinions on the following question:

Are we doing all that we can or should to promote the welfare of Honolulu and Hawaii?

I do not refer simply to the Hawaii Promotion Committee, but to the several commercial bodies of the Territory and to the community in general. I do not believe that there can be very much criticism regarding what we have done and are doing, but the point is, are there any other lines along which we could and should work?

In recent years promotion work has come to be recognized as something of a science, or at least a business proposition, which recognizes that anything which makes a community better or more attractive, helps everybody in proportion to that community. It also is now better recognized than formerly that promotion work must look ahead and build for the future as well as for the immediate needs.

The importance of team work, and general co-operation has been also most amply demonstrated in this kind of work in many cities, and there has yet to be found a more efficient and powerful leadership than is to be found in the business and commercial organizations of a community. If bodies of this kind are willing to lend their support or encouragement, all other organizations, such as improvement clubs, women's clubs, educational bodies, etc., have a backing which often accomplishes the seemingly impossible. There is often a disposition on the part of busy business men to consider many proposals for the improvement of the city to be too visionary, or to be out of their province if they do not pertain directly to commercial matters. This is an old idea, and is being rapidly gotten away from by the most progressive and powerful organizations of business men in the United States. Examples of such organizations are to be found in the Chicago Association of Commerce, the Cleveland Chamber of Commerce, the Boston Chamber of Commerce. This last-named body I might mention
