

PENAL SUMMONS FOR HEEDLESS DRIVING

J. Gunn, a hackman, has sworn out a penal summons against Mrs. Almy for heedless driving. It appears that on the night of January 17 the lady in question and several others took a run out to Walkiki in an automobile and, during the course of their journey, managed to collide with the hack driven by Gunn.

The hack was badly smashed and the horse injured as well. All the harness was broken and the repair bill came to a large amount. If the bill had been paid there would have been no penal summons, but as Gunn claims that he cannot get his hack back from the repair shop until the bill is paid—and he won't pay it himself—the matter will have to be threshed out in the Police Court tomorrow morning.

POLICE COURT JOTTINGS

At the Police Court this morning most of the time was taken up with an assault case in which Police Officer J. T. Baker of Wahiawa is figuring as the defendant.

It appears that on October 13 of last year the complaining witness, Chinese, was watching some countrymen play some kind of a game in his house where the rest of the bunch roamed. According to the complaint, the officer dashed into the house and grabbed him by the throat and invited him to go to the Waiaina police court.

E. C. Peters, who appeared for the defendant, sought to prove that the police officer had simply done his duty, and that when he grabbed the Chinaman all the rest of the Chinese jumped him and threw him out of the house.

The case was not concluded and it was put over till Friday next; there was much speculation as to why an assault case that happened last October should not be brought before the court till this late date. It appears that the complainant had employed private counsel to prosecute the case, and that the matter was allowed to drop. However, the matter was taken up by the authorities, and the present proceedings are the result.

There were several warm passages at arms between A. M. Brown, who prosecuted, and Attorney Peters, who appeared for the accused police officer. Coward Gets Six Months.

David Leleo was given a well deserved sentence of six months goal by Judge Andrade this morning. He was also ordered to pay costs amounting to \$330 and altogether the sentence was thought to be a good one for the tough.

It appears that Leleo is a confirmed woman beater, and he has already served a sentence for a like offense. The present assault took place on a Rapid Transit car which was running down Nuuanu avenue. Annie Reter was the unfortunate woman in the case, and she was treated in a fierce fashion by Leleo. All her clothes were torn off and she was black and blue from the punches dealt out by the cowardly fellow.

The assault was unprovoked, and Judge Andrade besides sentencing the man gave him a severe lecture on the enormity of his offense.
