The Fort Shafter target range will be used for the coming target season by the 2nd Battalion, 20th Infantry, and Company G, 2nd Battalion, Engineers, and later, perhaps, other organizations will use the range for common practice. The range is set aside for use as follows: Companies E, F, G and H, 20th Infantry, from April 1 to June 30; and Company G, 2nd Battalion Engineers, from July 1 to September 30.

The firing this season will be under the new regulations and appears to be a much harder course than called for in the old firing regulations. The men at the school of musketry, Presidio of Monterey, Cal., the last four months' term of instruction, were drilled in and fired the new course and will be an aid to the men that have never fired under the new regulations. Drills will soon begin, teaching the men and giving them instruction in firing an army rifle.

TOYO KISEN KAISHA

DOUBLES CAPITAL

Examiner, Jan. 27.—The Japanese steamship company, Toyo Kisen Kaisha, has taken in a lot of new capital. One result of this step is the resignation of S. T. Sakahara as vice-president, and the election of P. Okawa of Tokio to succeed him. The position of general manager has been created and given to Baron Okawa. He represents the capitalists who have put new capital into the corporation, and he has long been prominent in the shipping and financial circles of Japan.

The new vice-president and general manager is on his way here to inspect the company's affairs, and will arrive next week. He is accompanied by W. H. Avery of this city, the assistant general manager for the United States. Managing Director M. Shirahashi, the son-in-law of President S. Asano of the company, is also in the party.

The original capital of the company was 20,000,000 yen. It has now been increased by 20,000,000 yen, making a total of about \$25,000,000 in American money. The report that this additional new capital is a preliminary step for a merger with the Nippon Yusen Kaisha, which has a service between Seattle and the Orient, is denied by those who say they know the facts.

The Toyo Kisen Kaisha has been extensively improving and adding to its service during the last two years.

HERE'S A ROTTEN ROAD.


The Supervisors have had the matter brought to their attention through a communication from Secretary Magdalena of the Kalihi Improvement Club.

MANY GAMBLERS

Through the energetic campaign instituted by Sheriff Jarrett, and his deputies, Rose, Kellett and McDuffie, the gay and elusive gamester of Celestial ancestry has been kept on the jump during the month of January and several well known local Chinese gamblers were landed and given stiff fines.

Sheriff Jarrett has submitted a report to the City and County Supervisors which shows that out of 327 arrests made by the police last month, 255 convictions resulted, and but 39 were discharged. Of the total number of arrests 55 were Hawaiian, 51 Chinese, 44 Japanese, 17 Porto Ricans and 58 of scattering nationality. The city and county coffers were enriched to the tune of \$2,228.65 by fines collected.

Offenders range from gamblers, who numbers 106, drunks, 47, assault and battery 39, exceeding speed limit 15, optum violations 6 and vagrants 10.

BINGER HERMAN

GOES ON STAND

PORTLAND, Jan. 31.—Binger Hermann took the stand today in his own behalf in his trial on a charge of conspiracy to defraud the government of public lands. His testimony was a general and specific denial of any connection whatever with any conspiracy.

Thenceforth the defendant testified he had consistently opposed the creation of forest reserves and had declared that he would not alter this opposition until the Hen land law was repealed or at least modified so as to prevent this unfair exchange.

In September, 1901, the defendant said, he paid a visit to the office of Henry Meldrum, United States surveyor-general of Oregon. It is the government's contention that on this visit to the surveyor-general's office Hermann entered into a conspiracy with F. P. Mays an Oregon politician which resulted in the formation of the Blue Mountain forest reserve.

Hermann declared that on the visit to Meldrum's office he did not see Mays. The conversation that took place defendant said, was of a general nature, no official business of any kind coming up for consideration.

LAND AVAILABLE FOR STREET PURPOSES.

Superintendent of Public Works Marston Campbell has advised the Board of Supervisors that he has secured for the Territory of Hawaii a title to a certain parcel of land situated in front of the Hutchace property and adjoining the Sachs Building on Beretania avenue between Fort and Nuuanu streets, the same being required for street widening purposes.

Superintendent Campbell also reports having secured title to the necessary land required for the widening of Bethel street between Hotel and King. When the city is ready to take up the work of widening the thoroughfare the hackstand now occupying the corner will be ordered to vacate.

FUTURE FOR MIDDLE STREET EXTENSION

The future is extremely bright for a speedy extension of Middle street. Marston Campbell has notified the city and County Supervisors that he will use his best endeavors to secure the necessary land for the opening of Middle street. The Territorial Superintendent of Public Works was extended a vote of thanks at last night's meeting of the city solons for his efforts towards securing the required property.
