**EUROPE PLANS BIG  
ROOSEVELT RECEPTION**

KHARTOUM, Mar. 13.—This city is decked in gala attire in anticipation of the arrival of Theodore Roosevelt tomorrow. Mrs. Roosevelt and her daughter Ethel are now here ready to welcome the former President.  
An elaborate series of entertainments has been planned in honor of the distinguished visitor.  
The Khartoum reception will be the first of a series of gorgeous functions which will be pulled off in honor of the homecoming traveler.  
Not since the around-the-world tour of President Grant have any such plans been made for the entertainment of an American, and there is keen rivalry between the cities which Colonel Roosevelt will visit, each being determined to outdo the other.  
Colonel Roosevelt is generally considered in Europe to have been the greatest of American Presidents.  
The arrival at Khartoum practically marks the return of Colonel Roosevelt to civilization, and the people of this city are determined to take full advantage of their opportunity to extend the first formal welcome to the old world.

**COASTWISE LAWS NOT VIOLATE D.**

WASHINGTON, D. C., Mar. 13.—The Hamburg-American liner Cleveland will not be fined for landing her around-the-world passengers at San Francisco. Attorney General Wickersham yesterday rendered an opinion to the effect that the coastwise shipping law was not violated.  
In his opinion the Attorney General said that taking a party of tourists out on a sightseeing trip does not constitute a violation of the coastwise shipping law, and that the landing at San Francisco was a mere incident. The status is just the same as it would have been had the Cleveland returned to New York.

**GERMANY TO HAVE AERIAL FIGHTER.**

TRIER, Germany, Mar. 13.—The German army is to be equipped with an armored flying machine intended for offensive operations. An air cruiser, carrying from fifty to sixty men and capable of sailing from forty-four to fifty miles an hour, will be launched this coming spring.  
The aerial man-o-war will be constructed of iron, will weigh thirty tons and will be modeled along the plans laid down by Count Zeppelin. Five motors, capable of developing 400 horsepower, will furnish the motive energy for the gigantic instrument of war.

**GERMANY AND ENGLAND ARE FRIENDS.**

HAMBURG, Mar. 13.—Prince Henry of Prussia tonight delivered a body blow to the jingo party in Germany when, at a meeting of the East Asiatic Society of this city, he made a speech in which he said that England offered Germany nothing but honorable friendship. He added that no aggressive action against Germany is in the mind of the British government.  
The jingo newspapers of late have made considerable capital out of the war talk in which a certain section of the British press has indulged of late.

**PHILADELPHIA DEADLOCK CONTINUES.**

PHILADELPHIA, Mar. 13.—The central labor union today ordered all milkmen, bakers and grocers' clerks to strike. The men will walk out on Tuesday, in accordance with the instructions of the central organization.  
Every day sees conditions becoming more serious. The laborites are determined to bring the street car company to terms, while the officers of the company declare that they will not be coerced into granting the demands of the striking employees.
