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

ENGLISH POLO MEN LEFT FOR HOME

Englishmen Won Every Game They Played on Coast - Team is Good One.

In a whirl of gaiety almost to the last moment the victorious English polo players who have been the guests of the San Mateo Polo Club for a month and a half bade adieu yesterday to San Francisco and their many new-found friends, says the Examiner of April 19. They left on the overland limited for Chicago, where they will not spend more than one day, going on to Lakewood, N. J., for the spring polo tournament at George Gould's Georgian Court.
Major and Mrs. H. R. Lee, Twentieth Hussars; Major and Mrs. G. W. Hobson, Twelfth Lancers; F. A. Gill, manager of the Raleigh Polo Club, and Lieutenant F. B. Hurnday of the Twentieth Hussars composed the little party of travelers that carried away the polo championship of California, the John D. Spreckels challenge cup that goes with it, and the All-American polo trophy.
Prescott Scott and Cyril Tobin Saturday afternoon took the two cavalry majors to their first baseball game, which they watched with growing interest as they became familiar with the play. Lieutenant Herdald elected to go to Emeryville, and left with a poor opinion of American racing compared with the sport in Europe.
During their stay in California the visitors made the following record:
Beat Meadowbrook-Burlingame team by 8 goals to 2 at El Cerrito, March 13th.
Beat Riverside by 13 goals to 2 at Coronado March 20th in first round for the John D. Spreckels challenge cup and championship of California.
Beat Coronado by 10 goals to 3, March 22nd, in second round.
Beat Burlingame by 8 goals to 4, March 24th, in final.
Beat Burlingame by 9 goals to 1, March 27th, in final for All-America Polo Trophy.
"I doubt if we will be able to return next year," said Major Hobson before saying good-bye. "It would be very jolly if we could, but it is not likely the three of us in active service will be able to get away again together for such a trip. Mr. Gill may bring over another team next winter if Burlingame invites him to do so, and in that case we stay-at-homes will envy our successors to Burlingame's and Coronado's hospitality and good times. Of course we are glad we won, but quite apart from that we have been given a most hospitable and awfully good time."
F. A. Gill will return four months hence to New York, having been requested to undertake the management of the Naragansett polo tournament in August, when the international polo cup will be played for if England declines to challenge for a contest this year.
