HAWAIIAN SINGERS FIND THEY CAN SPEAK MAORI

Local Boys See Small Difference in Two Spoken Languages.

Ernest Kaai and his singers, who have returned from a long and successful tour in the Antipodes, confirm the news that Kaai sent in a letter to the local promotion committee, that the Hawaiians and Maoris found themselves able to talk to each other.
Tom Carter, one of the members of the troupe, says that the only difference noticed in the languages is that the Hawaiian uses "i" where the Maori uses "e" and that the Hawaiian "k" is used as "t" by the Maoris.
The Hawaiians were welcomed at a Maori meeting in the traditional way of rubbing noses. Kaai, Carter and others had to pass down a line rubbing noses with about a hundred of the Southern cousins, and Carter says it was harder than a presidential hand-shaking. The Maoris gave them a great welcome, in which a tribal dance figured prominently. The dance is called the Haka, and in the course of it the Maoris roll their eyes, stick out their tongues and otherwise contort their features horribly, but the effect is striking.
The troupe of Hawaiians was received with great applause everywhere and the soloists had to respond to many encores. In the coronation number of the New Zealand Weekly Graphic appears a long article about the troupe, in which it is stated that the part-singing of the members "have won for them the reputation of being the finest harmonizers that ever toured Australasia. The whole entertainment is decidedly clever and replete with brilliant vocal and instrumental gems of melody. The conductor of the Australian Banjo and Guitars Club said that nothing has ever been heard in Australia to approach the marvelous instrumentation of the Hawaiians and the orchestration of their melodies was a musical treat that comes but seldom in a musician's life."

MANY TRAILS WILL BE BUILT

Rest-Houses and New Paths For Many Good Climbs On Oahu.

Trails and rest-houses in many parts of the mountains of Oahu will be established soon, according to a report made by the corresponding secretary yesterday to the Trail and Mountain club, at a meeting held at noon in Public Service Association headquarters. The report says in part:
The Trail and Mountain club since its inception a year and a half ago has suffered considerably from the lack of any permanent home and headquarters. This has been remedied by securing with the Civic Federation and others a downtown headquarters for the Trail and Mountain club, where its clerical work is placed in the hands of a corps of workers and rooms maintained for meetings and as a general meeting place of members.
At a meeting of the several public service bodies-organizing the Public Service Association, Mr. Castle, as President of the Trail and Mountain club, stated that he would guarantee that that body would appropriate \$500 for the coming year to start the new headquarters and to help keep it alive for that length of time.
Through the kindness of Mr. Castle a trail has been built from back of Punchbowl hill a number of miles around the mountains, ascending Olympus and descending to Manoa Valley. This trail is placed under the charge of the Trail and Mountain club. Mr. Castle also intends to build one rest house of simple construction on Panoa flats, overlooking both Nuuanu and Manoa valleys. This will come under the control of the Trail and Mountain club.
Mrs. Cooke has built a trail for the club from the site of the proposed rest house to the dam in Nuuanu valley; from there there is a path to the Pali road.
New Pali Trail.
Mr. Lowrey is building a trail from the Pali road to the summit of Lanikuli. To connect the trail Mr. Castle has built with the Manoa road. Judge Cooper is building a trail to the summit of the ridge between Manoa and Palolo valleys. The Kaimuki Land Co. has built an excellent trail from the Palolo road to Palolo crater. From here on there is a good trail to the Castle trail to Olympus.
The members of the Trail and Mountain club have made a passable trail from Palolo crater over the seven falls to the main road, in Palolo valley. The Kaimuki Land Co. will build a rest house on the edge of Palolo crater for the Trail and Mountain club. Mr. Stanton of the 199,000 club and the Kaimuki Land Co. states that a trail will be built from Wilhelmina Rise to its summit, where a rest house will be built and decided over to the Trail and Mountain club. From this rest house he intends building a trail along that ridge to Palolo crater and around the crater. It is possible that the crater when it becomes a public reservoir will be turned into a lake and the surrounding hillsides parked.
Other Extensions.
On the Diamond Head side of Palolo crater the valleys belong to Mr. Paul Leenberg and Judge Perry. There

is no doubt that they will gladly continue the trail along the ridge and down into the adjoining valleys.
Now that the club has headquarters and a working force, it is proposed to take up actively with the residents of Molokai and Kaui to the mapping and making of trails on those islands. On Hawaii the branch organized has formed itself into a separate club. There are numerous offers of co-operation, however, from landholders and others scattered over the big island. These matters can be taken up and adjusted with the Hilo club.
No dues have been collected for the club for more than a year. It is proposed now, however, to collect the dues for this year and begin an active campaign for new members, as the club has much to show and the enthusiasm of the few great workers has aroused to effort many willing small workers, who will gladly cut trails within their means and help as they can.
A trail is needed for about four-fifths of a mile from Tantalus Heights along the cliffs above Manoa Valley and Panoa flats to connect with the Castle trail. The cost of this would be about \$200.

Jordan, can arrange their itinerary with the greatest advantage and without loss of time, for instance, Mr. and Mrs. H. D. Hesse, passengers on the "Nippon Maru" which arrived off port about 11 a. m. last Tuesday were most anxious to visit the Volcano but unless able to leave for Hawaii that day could not make the trip as they had to continue their journey to the Orient by the "Siberia" sailing the 24th. The "Mauna Kea" had already sailed but as soon as the steamer reached the wharf, Mr. Jordan hurried to our phone in the Alakea wharf building and getting in touch with the Inter-island Steamship Company, they very kindly held the "Mauna Kea" for nearly half an hour in order to accommodate Mr. and Mrs. Hesse.
Mr. Loyd Childs still continues to secure effective publicity for Hawaii with his moving picture films and Hawaiian singers. He is now in Colorado. Concerning his work, Mr. Frank Wiggins, Secretary of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce, writes under date of July 7th:
