TURKEY AND ITALY MAY WAR

(Associated Press Cable.)
ROME, Italy, Sept. 24.—War with Turkey is imminent. The greatest excitement prevails in the capital and the cry is for war.

Every preparation is being rushed for an armed demonstration against Turkey, unless the latter country will agree to an Italian protectorate over Tripoli.

Demands Whole Province.
The demands of Italy are that this province, belonging to Turkey, on the north coast of Africa, be ceded to Italy in the same manner as France holds Algeria.

To date the Turkish government has refused to consider such a transfer of authority, and it is for this reason that Italy has determined upon an armed demonstration.

Fleet and Army Ready.
It is now asserted as a fact that Italy is ready to send her whole fleet to Tripoli, conveying an army of 60,000 men, to take possession of the country.

PRESIDENT TALKS AT BIG BANQUET
ST. LOUIS, Mo., Sept. 24.—President Taft made two particularly interesting assertions before a brilliant gathering at the banquet tendered him in this city last evening: one on tariff problems and the other in regard to the recall of the judiciary.

The President referred to the criticisms which had been so freely made in regard to the work of this commission and stated that they were unfounded.

Power of Impeachment.
In regard to the recall principle of the judiciary, the President deprecated any such possibility as destructive to the impartial honesty of the court.

As a substitute, however, he emphatically urged a wider power of impeachment in such cases where there was reason to believe that a recall of a judge would be beneficial to justice.

GETTING IN LINE
BALTIMORE, Md., Sept. 24.—The visit of President Taft to this city tomorrow has had the effect of uniting all the Republican factions in this district.

Both of these byline incidents mark a red-letter day in the history of aeronautics.

RELATIVES SUE FOR HARVEY ELDER'S DEATH
LOS ANGELES, Cal., Sept. 24.—Upon the eve of the trial of the McNamara brothers and almost just a year after the blowing up of the Times office on October 1, 1910, the widow and mother of Harvey Elder have filed suit against General H. G. Otis and the Times-Mirror Publishing Company for \$50,000 damages on account of the death of Elder, who was assistant city editor of the Times on the night of the explosion and jumped from a window, dying a few hours later.

MORE ARTILLERY COMING TO MAN THE LOCAL FORTS
WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 24.—General Bliss recommends that two new companies of Coast Artillery be sent at once to Oahu, Territory of Hawaii, to man the batteries of Fort Kamehameha, at Pearl Harbor, and Fort Armstrong, at the entrance to Honolulu harbor. It is asserted that the recommendations will probably be carried out as soon as transportation can be provided.

FANS DO UP BASEBALL UMPIRE.
CLEVELAND, O., Sept. 24.—There was almost a tragedy at the baseball park here today when Umpire William Evans severely beat two fans who criticized an unpopular decision he had made.

A mob attacked Evans and before he could be rescued he was only beaten. It is believed he would have been killed if the police had not defended him from the crowd.

MADERO SURE TO WIN.
CITY OF MEXICO, Sept. 24.—It is now realized here that with the practical withdrawal of General Bernardo Reyes as a candidate for the presi-

deputy of Mexico. General Francisco L. Madero Jr. is certain of election.

There is a strong feeling developing in favor of Francisco de la Barra for vice-president. He has made an excellent record as the provisional president of the republic.

EARTHQUAKES SHAKE CITY.
QUAYAHUIL, Ecuador, Sept. 24.—Four earthquakes of particular violence have shaken this city and caused a great deal of damage. In the nearby city of Riobamba houses were shaken down and a panic ensued among the inhabitants.

WOULD DELAY THE McNAMARA TRIAL
LOS ANGELES, Cal., Sept. 24.—Clarence Darrow, chief counsel for the McNamara brothers, accused of blowing up the Los Angeles Times building, announced yesterday that he will ask for two extra weeks' delay in the trial on Monday.

Darrow asserts that he will need this time to enable him to make preparation, as he has been impeded by the harassments of the prosecution in the completion of the defense.

AVIATOR CROSSING THE HIGH SIERRAS
COLFAX, Cal., Sept. 24.—Aviator Fowler of Los Angeles, who is trying to make the flight across the continent for a prize of \$50,000, flew forty miles today to Emigrant Gap, where his engine failed him. He will be over tomorrow and start Tuesday in a third effort to cross the mountains.

AUTHOR LOOMIS DEAD.
HARTFORD, Conn., Sept. 24.—Chas. F. Loomis, the author, died here yesterday of cancer of the stomach. Mr. Loomis was born in Brooklyn in 1861, and had been well known as a writer for the magazines and as an author since the early nineties. One of his best known works was "Cheerful Americans."

FRYE PLACE TAKEN BY OBDIAH GARDNER
PORTLAND, Me., Sept. 24.—Governor Plaflet yesterday appointed Obdiah Gardner, Democrat, as United States Senator to succeed the late William Pierce Frys. This makes a total of forty-two Democrats in the upper house.

HAYRIDERS KILLED BY FLYING TRAIN
NEENAH, Wis., Sept. 24.—A joy ride in a hayrick by a party of playboys here today ended in a horrible tragedy when a train struck the wagonload of people and hurled them to their deaths and injured five more seriously.

TWO KILLER WRECKED
CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 24.—Two passenger trains from Chicago were wrecked here today when they collided with a freight train and the firemen and engineers were killed.

PORT SAID Suez Canal. Sept. 24.—The report is emphatic here that a Turkish warship has captured the Italian liner Regina Margherita at Messina.
