### NOTED LEADER IN RELIGION TO SPEAK

In securing Mr. Hubert Carleton of Boston for his Sunday meeting the Y. M. C. A. has given the men of Honolulu a chance to hear one of the foremost leaders in the foremost religious movements of the generation, "The Men and Religion Forward Movement." This movement is a great union movement of practically all the strong churches and their subsidiary organizations, such as the International Sunday School Association, the International Y. M. C. A., and church brotherhoods. No religious movement of modern times has attempted so much, or so measured up to its program, as this has. Leadership in this movement marks Mr. Carleton as one of the big men in church work in America. For this he is well qualified, having both natural ability as an executive, a writer, and speaker, and having university training leading to the degrees of M.A. and D.C.L.

Mr. Carleton is only loaned to this movement for a period of special work. His real connection is with the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, of which he is general secretary for America, and of whose official organ, St. Andrew's Cross, he is editor. When the "Men and Religion Forward Movement" was organized by a number of strong laymen, Mr. Carleton was called upon to edit the book to be used in preparing cities for campaigns, and the well known book, "Men and Religion" is his work, the introduction and one chapter being his own work the other articles contributed by experts along different lines. For this movement is a broad one, working along sociological as well as religious lines. The meeting at the Y. M. C. A. Sunday afternoon will be held in Cooke Hall at 4:20 o'clock, and is open to all men. The topic of Mr. Carleton's address is "A Man in a World of Men."

### BABIES DAY AT MATERNITY HOME

All those who first saw the light of day in the Kapiolani Maternity Home are especially invited to participate in the "Babies' Day" festivities which are planned for next Saturday, January 6, from 2 until 5 o'clock.

The honored guests will include a number of people twenty years of age, as well as a large array of infants of all sizes and complexions. The group of "exhibits" will be very interesting indeed and will doubtless serve as an admirable advertisement for the Home. Although not as boastful as the manufacturers of Mellin's food, the matron and nursing corps are proud of the record of healthy babies the Home has produced. A complete record of the number of babies born at the institution is not available, but of recent years the birth-rate has averaged one hundred and fifty each twelve months.

The reception next Saturday will partake of the nature of a Founder's Day celebration and a cordial invitation is extended to the general public.
