LA FOLLETTE IN FIRST PLACE

(Associated Press Cable.)

FARGO, S. D., March 19.—Senator Robert La Follette, leader of the insurgent movement but supposed to be a back-number in the succeeding Progressive Republican movement, won hands down the choice of this State for the Presidential nomination in the first primaries held today. They were the first primaries under the recent challenge from Roosevelt to Taft.

Although the suggestion for them came in the form of a challenge from Roosevelt's campaign manager, Senator Dixon, to Representative McKinley, standard bearer of the Taft forces, both Roosevelt and Taft were left in the cold by this State.

Roosevelt was second, however, while Taft trailed third. The exact figures have not been reached but La Follette's manager claims for him a plurality of 17,000 over his powerful rivals.

The result of the primaries has come as a shock to this and neighboring Progressive States and the country in general, as the political situation must be recapitulated. La Follette, eclipsed by Roosevelt, was supposed to have been out of the race in favor of the Oyster Bay candidate.

LITTLE COAL FOR BIG-POWER NAVIES.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 19.—With the navy yards of the country short of coal and the foreign steamship lines outbidding the Government the Navy Department is now becoming anxious before the predicament facing it when the general coal strike is extended to America.

The approaching possibility of a coal strike backing up the European strike has just been forcibly impressed upon the department. A hasty inventory of the coal now held by the Government at its various stations gave additional cause for alarm. Upon its venture into the market as a bidder, however, it found itself outbid by foreign steamer lines, which are now depending on America for their coal supply.

The United States and British navies are now both in the same box.

EXPOSING LETTERS OF THE SUGAR TRUST.

NEW YORK, N. Y., March 19.—The commencement of documentary evidence in the great Sugar Trust cases here today added impetus to the excitement which has been gradually growing over them.

United States District Attorney Wise offered in evidence, and finally had accepted, correspondence between the late Henry O. Havemeyer and John E. Parsons. His object, he announced, was to show that a loan to General Segal had been used by them as a club to secure control of his refinery.

"Segal squirming," wrote Parsons in one of the letters, dated in June, 1904.

They were making observations from a captive balloon this afternoon when through an accident the anchor-ropes broke and the balloon commenced to drift away. After some frantic attempts had been made to let the gas out and sink back to earth, the balloon suddenly burst into flame. It fell almost at once, both its occupants falling with it.

HORRIBLE ACCIDENT IN CALIFORNIA TOWN.

VISALIA, Cal., March 19.—In attempting to put out a fire destroying the barn, the Thompson family of this place were probably fatally injured by the explosion of some forgotten dynamite this afternoon. The father, mother and three children were all near the blaze at the time it occurred and all were horribly injured by flying lumber and the force of the explosion.

ANOTHER BLOW AT MADERIST FORCES.

CHIHUAHUA, Mex., March 19.—General Soto Parral, commanding the federal garrison entrusted with the defense of this city against the rebels today went over to the rebel forces himself, taking with him all the troops stationed in the city.

PUGILISM PAYS.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 19.—"Uncle Tom" McCarry of this city, builder of McCarry's Pavilion and one of the best-known fight magnates on the Slope, today offered John Kilbane of Cleveland \$50,000 for his exclusive service for the next two years.

MINIMUM WAGE BILL IS PASSING THROUGH.

LONDON, Eng., March 19.—The House of Commons tonight passed at first reading the Government's bill for a miners' minimum wage, introduced by Premier Asquith according to his previous promise. The result of the final vote is awaited anxiously all over the kingdom.

MARYLAND IN LINE.

ANNAPOLIS, Md., March 19.—The Assembly of Maryland today finished action on a bill providing for State-wide local option, it being carried by a generous vote. It is believed that it will meet with executive approval and is expected to be law at once.

BANDIT MAKES BIG HAUL.

CORINTH, Miss., March 19.—In an exciting holding of a train over the Mobile & Ohio Railroad near here, this afternoon, an unknown bandit blew up the safe in the express car and successfully escaped. According to reports, the man got away with fully \$50,000.
