## MORE FUNDS FOR PROMOTION WORK STRONGLY URGED

Merchants' Association Members Favor Larger Wharf Tax Division.

Following a statement made by Secretary H. P. Wood as to the results accomplished by the Promotion Committee and a prophesy of what could be done if more funds were available, the Merchants' Association yesterday afternoon passed a resolution instructing its delegates to the Shippers' Wharf Committee to inquire from that body as to whether it would be willing to have the present wharfage tax doubled and the extra amount given to the Promotion Committee. This matter was brought to the attention of the members by Earl A. Bernall, who has advocated such a policy on many previous occasions.

The committee is to report back to a special meeting of the Merchants' Association to be held later. In outlining his scheme Bernall said that when the tax on incoming freight was first instituted a charge of twenty-five cents a ton was made. This had now been reduced to ten cents. "Why can't we," he said, "add another ten cents to the present tax on the wharfage?"

The extra money is handed over to the Promotion Committee. I have been saying that such a course as this is planned for a long time past, but it has not met with much favor. Now, however, I think that after we have heard the statement made by Secretary Wood, we should consider the matter."

Canvass Businessmen. The pros and cons of the matter were discussed at length. W. R. Richardson suggested that the first thing to be done was to canvass the businessmen and find out whether they were agreeable to such a course. He then suggested as a motion that notice of this action be sent by mail to each member of the Association and that a special meeting of the Association be called two weeks hence for further instruction of the delegates to the Shippers' Wharf Committee.

"I have heard," he continued, "during my wanderings around town that most of the smaller men are willing to do anything without giving much thought to how it will affect the larger firms. When it comes down to a matter of brass knuckles, however, it is just as Mr. Macfarlane says—in the end the consumer pays the tax and thus the burden is not placed on the merchant but on the community generally. I do not think that there can be any doubt as to the final result of this move; rather it is only a matter of ways and means."

Finally on the motion of Ed Towse it was decided that the matter be left in the hands of the special delegates and that they report at a meeting to be called later.

Proposing to bring the pilots and pilots of the country still further under the regulation of the Federal Government, a bill has been introduced in the House of Representatives and referred to the Committee on Merchant Marine and Fisheries.
