### POSTAL CARD VOTE WILL BE TAKEN SOON

As stated in the Bulletin some time ago, there will be a "postal card vote" of businessmen of the city on the amount of money that should be put into the Hawaii exhibit at the San Francisco Exposition. One hundred thousand dollars is said to be about the limit desired by the joint committee of the Chamber of Commerce and Merchants' Association. Whether or not any funds will be advanced to the Hawaii Fair Commission before the Legislature meets and appropriation is formally made, is uncertain.
