A. H. CO. ANNOUNCE TWO NEW FREIGHTERS FOR THE PACIFIC

Honolulu will be a port of call for two of the very latest freight-carriers soon to be placed in operation by the American-Hawaiian line.

Through advices received here this morning five new big cargo steamships under construction by the American-Hawaiian line are fast nearing completion. A list of the names for the new vessels has been received here and it includes the Pennsylvania, Panamanian, Minnesotan, Montanan, and Dakotan.

It is now, more or less positively stated that the freighters Pennsylvania and the Panamanian will be sent into the Pacific to take place in the triangular service which includes the Hawaiian Islands. The remaining three freighters will ply the Atlantic. With the opening of the Panama Canal, which will remove the necessity of transferring freight from the Atlantic by rail to the Pacific, the big bottoms will come to the Pacific via the great waterway.

The American-Hawaiian Company operates a fleet of eighteen steamers, exclusive of chartered vessels. In the

VESSELS TO AND FROM THE ISLANDS

(Special Cable to Merchants' Exchange.)

Wednesday, May 8.
SAN FRANCISCO—Sailed, May 8, 2 p. m., S. S. Wilhelmina for Honolulu.

Two Windjammers at Hilo.
Hilo waterfront is enlivened with the presence of two windjammers—the ship John Ena taking on sugar destined for the east coast of the United States and the schooner Robert Searles, now discharging a consignment of lumber. These vessels were reported with the arrival of the Inter-Island steamer Claudine this morning. The Claudine returned from Hawaii by way of Maui ports with cargo including 20 cords wood, 11,216 feet lumber, 57 bales hidden and 168 packages sundries. The Claudine is scheduled to sail for regular ports of call on Friday evening.

Fuel oil for the local branch of the Union Oil Company arrived this morning in the American ship Falls of Clyde. The vessel left Gaviota on April 20th and experienced a fine trip to the islands. The Falls of Clyde brought 17,500 barrels of oil which is being pumped into the twelve tanks.

ODDS AND ENDS AT THE PORT

The Inter-Island steamer Hall, for Kauai ports, is on the boards for dispatch tomorrow evening.

The oil-tanker W. F. Herrin sailed for Kanaunali last evening, there to discharge 25,000 barrels oil.

The large mainland mail received by the Matson steamship Lurline this morning was given quick dispatch from the vessel to the postoffice.

Taking a fair list of passengers and large consignments of supplies and general cargo, the Inter-Island steamer Kinau sailed for Kauai ports last evening.

Preparations toward the dispatch of the American ship Edward Sewall are being made with the view of the sailing of that vessel for the east coast of the United States today.

The Inter-Island has taken over complete possession of the big Brewer wharf, formerly occupied by the Matson Navigation Company. From the new Inter-Island wharf, situated at the foot of Nuuanu street, will be dispatched the steamers Claudine, Kinau, Hall, Mikahala and perhaps the Kilaua.

The larger wharf will afford the Inter-Island far better facilities for the speedy handling of outward and inward cargoes as well as accommodate the increasing quantities of freight brought to the structure in transit.

Several commodious suites of offices are well adapted to the needs of the company and its staff of representatives.

Up to the noon hour today Chief of Detectives McDuffie had not arrested one Stafford, who is supposed to have come in the Lurline, which arrived from San Francisco this morning. McDuffie is still looking for Stafford, having stationed some of his men to watch the Lurline.

Stafford, it is understood, is wanted by the police authorities in San Francisco on a charge of burglary. McDuffie was notified by cable to place the man under arrest as soon as the Lurline came within the jurisdiction of the Territory. Although a thorough search was made on board the Matson liner, Stafford could not be located.

McDuffie, who has been granted a leave of absence for two months, will soon leave for the States. He will take Stafford along with him, if he is found, and another man who is expected to arrive in the Persia. The latter is wanted by the police in San Francisco for grand larceny.
