

ONLY TWO MORE DAYS REMAIN OF BULLETIN'S BIG CAMPAIGN

INCREASING OF LAST SCALE OF VOTES PROVES GREATEST INCENTIVE OF CONTEST—ONLY FORTY-EIGHT HOURS LEFT AFTER TODAY—HONOLULU AND THE ENTIRE TERRITORY UNDERGOING A THOROUGH CANVASSING—NARROW MARGIN OF VICTORY EXPECTED IN ALL DISTRICTS

Personality, Personal And Town Pride Big Factors In Race

Contestants Have Lined Up Home Communities Behind Them and With Undiminished Ardor and Energy are Working as Though Their Lives Depended Upon Their Efforts During These Last Two Days—And Their CONTEST LIVES DO DEPEND UPON THEIR EFFORTS NOW.

Enthusiasm to a point bordering upon frenzy and aroused to the opportunities of this contest as though it were an important political campaign, battling with every ounce of strength at their command to hold their places and striving to rise by dint of hard and earnest work, contestants in the Bulletin's GRAND POPULARITY CAMPAIGN are rapidly approaching their goal. About an hour later another young woman entered the contest office with TEN subscriptions, all secured in the territory covered by the one who had "got all." What the second contestant had done, the first could have accomplished equally as well. And so it goes, all over the Territory. The one who is really anxious and determined to win gets there in spite of everything. Literally in handfulls are subscriptions being brought in, showing the energetic work being done.

Narrow Margin of Victory.

The narrow margin of victory by which the prizes will be won, judging by present indications, makes even the smallest subscription of the utmost value, and, realizing this fact, contestants are taking no rest, but are conducting their campaigns as though their lives depended upon their efforts during these last days. And their contest lives surely do depend upon their energy during these last two days.

Important to Contestants.

Merely as a matter of caution and to assist candidates in every way to receive the full benefit of their work, are these lines printed. It is of the utmost importance that every contestant, and particularly contestants outside of Honolulu, read and weigh every word of it. We would dislike to see anyone lose votes because of the excitement which will surely attend the closing days, or because of any misunderstanding on their part. It is impossible for you to exercise too much care on arriving at a full understanding of the rules and conditions governing the contest.

1. All votes and remittances mailed after Thursday should bear a SPECIAL DELIVERY STAMP to insure their reaching us in time.

2. If you live outside of Honolulu and intend to mail your votes, take the precaution of finding out exactly what time your postoffice closes, and also find out all possible information in regard to train and steamer services.

3. All remittances and votes should be addressed directly to the "Contest Manager" at the Evening Bulletin office. This is to insure absolute accuracy and prevent any of them from going astray.

4. Be sure that your name is on every ballot before sending to this office. This is very important and absolutely necessary.

5. All votes and remittances must be mailed by 9 p. m. next Saturday night, June 22, in order to count in the contest. The postmark on the envelope or the postmaster's signature, showing that the envelope or package was mailed before 9 p. m., will be accepted as sufficient evidence.

6. UNDER NO CONDITIONS WILL VOTES BE TRANSFERRED FROM ONE CANDIDATE TO ANOTHER. THIS IS AN INVOLUBLE RULE OF THE CONTEST AND UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES WILL IT BE BROKEN.

When Final Votes Will Be Counted.

The final count of votes, which will determine the winners, will be held Wednesday, June 26, at 8 o'clock p. m., in the business office of the Bulletin, Alakea Street, Honolulu, and will be in charge of Messrs. John Soper of the Hawaiian News Co.; Oliver Lansing, the real estate operator; Geo. B. Curtis, manager of Jordan's; Wm. Battersby, advertising manager of Sachs & Co., and these gentlemen, whose standing and reputation in Honolulu is beyond question, have kindly consented to canvass the votes for the final count, and their selection insures every candidate an absolutely fair and impartial count. This count will be public, and candidates, their friends, and others interested in the contest are invited to be present.

No More Votes Returned.

Owing to the uncertainty of mail reaching candidates in time to be returned for the final count, the Contest Department will acknowledge by letter all votes and remittances received from candidates from this time on, but the votes will NOT be returned, but will be deposited in the ballot-box, to the credit of the proper candidate, instead of being returned to candidates, as has been done so far. This applies only to subscriptions sent in to us by mail.
