From the American Sentinel, of Nov. 7th. Man Killed.

On Thursday night last, two men on their return from Pike's Peak, camped on Wright's creek, about five miles above this place, and mingled freely with the settlers in that vicinity during the evening until quite late bedtime.

Whereas, The counties of Osage, Breckenridge and Coffey, at their convention, held at Ottumwa on the 15th of October, for the 12th Territorial and Representative District, under the Wyandott Constitution, adopted a preamble and resolutions in which they justly affirm, "That Southern Kansas has persistently been overlooked, and their claims disregarded in the distribution of Territorial, State and Federal offices."

Whereas, The counties of Madison, Coffey, Woodson, Greenwood, Franklin, Anderson, Allen, Linn, Butler, Hunter, Godfrey, Wilson, Dorn and McGee, of Southern Kansas, proper have been overlooked; and

Whereas, We fully endorse the sentiment that "southern Kansas has interests second to none in Kansas, which demand the special advocacy of one of her own citizens;" and

Convention of the 10th Senatorial and Representative District. The Convention of the 10th district, consisting of Franklin, Anderson and Allen counties, assembled at Garnet, on the 3rd day of November, and was organized by the appointment of Henry Williams, of Hyatt, as president, and Nathaniel Adams, of Allen county, as secretary.

On motion, a committee of one from each county was appointed on credentials, who reported the following as the delegates: W. W. H. Lawrence, James Hamray, John Bingham, J. E. Bear and H. A. Cook, of Franklin county; Henry Williams, S. S. Tipton, John Jones, W. A. Johnson and I. D. Ridgeway, of Anderson county; Dr. J. W. Scott, Nathaniel Adams, N. B. Blanton, John M. Perkins and Rufus Perkins, of Allen county.

On motion of W. W. H. Lawrence, the Convention proceeded to an informal ballot for two Senators, which resulted as follows: W. Sprigg, 15; P. P. Elder, 3; and Dr. J. W. Scott, 7. On motion, the Convention proceeded to a formal ballot, which resulted in the selection of Messrs. Sprigg and Elder, which was by motion made unanimous.

On motion of Dr. Scott, it was unanimously Resolved, That the following persons nominated by their respective county conventions, be declared the nominees of this Convention, as candidates to represent this District in the State Legislature, to wit: W. W. H. Lawrence and Jacob Marcelle, of Franklin county; W. F. M. Army and S. J. Crawford, of Anderson county; B. L. G. Stone and N. B. Blanton, of Allen county.

Whereas, The counties of Osage, Breckenridge and Coffey, at their convention, held at Ottumwa on the 15th of October, for the 12th Territorial and Representative District, under the Wyandott Constitution, adopted a preamble and resolutions in which they justly affirm, "That Southern Kansas has persistently been overlooked, and their claims disregarded in the distribution of Territorial, State and Federal offices;" and

Whereas, The counties of Madison, Coffey, Woodson, Greenwood, Franklin, Anderson, Allen, Linn, Butler, Hunter, Godfrey, Wilson, Dorn and McGee, of Southern Kansas, proper have been overlooked; and

Whereas, We regard the counties of Osage and Breckenridge as having received their due proportion of the nominations and offices, they have no just claim to any office to which southern Kansas is entitled upon the position which they have assumed in their preamble and resolutions therefore

Resolved, That we concede to northern and middle Kansas one U. S. Senator and the Representative in Congress, and that we claim as our right one Senator from southern Kansas proper, and we do protest against the claim set up by the Convention of the 12th District for a citizen of Osage county, (Hon. J. M. Wiggell) who has already had conferred upon him one of the highest and most honorable offices in the gift of the people of Kansas.

Resolved, That the candidates to the State Legislature, nominated by this Convention, and the Senators and Representatives from the counties in southern Kansas, be hereby requested to use all honorable means for the election of a citizen of southern Kansas proper, to the Senate of the United States.

On motion of N. B. Blanton, it was resolved, that we heartily endorse the nominations of the State Convention, at Topeka, as also the nomination of Solon O. Thacher as Judge of this judicial district, and that we will use our efforts to elect the whole ticket.

Trial of Capt. John Brown. Oct. 27.—A dispatch was received by Mr. Botts from Akron, Ohio, in reference to his insanity in Brown's family.— It was signed A. H. Lewis. Mr. Botts read it to John Brown, who said that in his father's family there never has been any insanity, but on his mother's side there have been repeated instances of it. He desired his counsel to say that he did not put in such a plea. He was totally unconscious of ever having put in such a plea.

Immediately after Mr. Botts made this statement, Brown raised himself in bed and said: "I will add, if the Court will allow me, that I look upon it as a miserable artifice and pretext of those who ought to take a different course in regard to me, if they took any at all, and I view it with contempt more than otherwise. As I remarked to Mr. Green, insane persons, so far as my experience goes, have but very little ability to judge of their own sanity, and if I am insane, I should think I knew more than all the rest of the world, but I do not think so, and I reject, so far as I am capable, any attempt to interfere in my behalf on that score."

The indictment filled seven pages, and contained three counts: 1st, insurrection; 2d, treason; 3d, murder. The questions of what constituted treason and of the jurisdiction of the State of Virginia over the Army grounds, were ably argued by Messrs. Green and Botts for the prisoners. Mr. Hunter replied for the commonwealth, stating that while under the federal law Brown might not be guilty of treason; under the State law, which was more full, he was.

The Court excluded from the jury those who were present at Harper's Ferry, and also those who had formed or expressed an opinion which would prevent them from giving an impartial decision. They are mostly farmers from a distance.

Oct. 29.—Samuel Chilton, of Washington City, and Henry Griswold, of Ohio, appeared as counsel for Brown. Several witnesses for the prisoner were examined, all proving that Brown had treated his prisoners with humanity, and frequently expressed his regret that bloodshed should have been caused by him in self-defense.

The defense closed their testimony about 9 P. M. They desired to give the case to the jury without argument, but Capt. Brown insisted that his counsel should argue the case.

After the opening speech for the State, the court adjourned till Monday morning, when the council for the prisoner will proceed. Oct. 31st.—The trial proceeded, Mr. Griswold reviewing the case in a lengthy speech.

The jury retired, and after an absence of half an hour, returned with a verdict of guilty of treason, advising conspiracy with slave and others to rebel, and of murder in the first degree. Mr. Chilton moved an arrest of judgment, both on account of errors in the indictment and the verdict.

The trial of Coppie was commenced. New York, Oct. 31st.—The Herald's Washington dispatch says I have it on the most reliable authority, that the death penalty will not be immediately inflicted on Brown.

Next year the eighth annual census of the United States is to be taken.
