Facts and Figures.

In 1874 George Morgan Thomas was chosen Circuit Judge of this district. He served one term, six years,—his successor Hon. A. E. Cole, being elected in 1880. The State paid Mr. Thomas \$14,000 for his services as Circuit Judge,—paid him that sum to attend to the duties of the office. Instead, however, of being at his post of duty, he was absent on thirty-three occasions in the six years, and special Judges had to be chosen to hold court for him. For these special Judges the State had to pay \$3,405.70, making the six years' service cost \$17,802.70 instead of \$14,000 as it ought to have done. The excuse offered by Judge Thomas' defenders is that he was "sick" and could not attend to the office, but a letter written from Vanceburg in 1877 says he was seemingly well and running around seeing to other business often when he ought to have been at his post as Judge.—Maysville Bulletin.

The Radical penny whoopers of this District are anxious to know why, if Judge Wall is so popular as Democratic press would have people to believe, that same press is so anxious to perfect an organizing that will bring out the entire vote of the party. The answer is simple. The danger to the Democracy lies chiefly in the popularity of its candidate. 
