Thank the Lord! Official returns show Kentucky and Texas to be Democratic.

The electoral vote, according to latest returns will stand 170 for Cleveland and 231 for Harrison.

The Republicans held an election last week and chose Benjamin Harrison President of these United States.

Hon. W. H. Barnum, ex-Chairman of the Democratic National Committee, is dangerously ill and is not expected to recover.

Are the leaders of the Prohibition party sincere in their declaration of principles? Then why did they support Harrison and free whisky?

Who said Kentucky was a doubtful State? 40,000 plurality for Cleveland and a gain of one and perhaps two Congressmen doesn't look much that way.

A clamor for offices, or at least a preparation for a grand election, has already begun in the Republican ranks. Let 'em squabble. We'll get a great deal of complacency out of a quiet look-on.

In these hours of Democratic sorrow the Democrats of the Ninth Congressional district get a great deal of consolation out of the fact that they have done their duty by redeeming the Ninth district from Republicanism.

The decision of the people: "Viduo meliora proboque, deteriora sequor." Freely translated: "We see the angels beckon, but prefer to follow the Devil." The English language is at present rather inadequate to the occasion.—Capital.

The last issue of the Ashland Republican was very suggestive of its bloody shirt policy. In its enthusiasm over the National result it printed an eagle and some headlines in flaming red. The news of the result in the Ninth, however, was printed in blue. Perfectly natural.

The latest report from West Virginia is that it went Democratic by about 400. Only the official count can decide whether Jackson or Smith is elected to Congress in the district just across the river. The Democrats have a majority of five in a joint ballot in the Legislature, which insures the election of a Democratic U. S. Senator.

It has been reported here that no election was held in Perry, county last week, owing to the turbulent state of affairs existing there. The French and Eversole factions are at war and State troops are in the county. If the report be true, the fact points strongly toward the election of Day to Congress, as Perry is a Republican county.

In order to keep this district safely in the Democratic ranks, the work of making the party more compact should begin now and be kept up continually. It has been, by loyal work, replaced in the Democratic lines, where it properly belongs, and the existence of perfect harmony is all that is needed to insure our continued representation in Congress by a Democrat.

Democrats do not yet concede the election Wilson to Congress in the 10th district. Twenty-one counties are included in the district, and nearly all of them are in the most remote part of the State, and reliable returns have certainly not yet been received. From the list of counties and their majorities which has been published by Louisville dailies, giving Wilson a majority of 305, Pike county is omitted. It gave Day over 300 majority.

Grover Cleveland's administration will go down in history as one of the best the country has ever seen. He has always acted in the interest of the people, regardless of political or personal results. He was, in a great measure, the architect of his own defeat, in that he

lost the support of a great many selfish persons who have been personally effected by acts of his which were in the interest of the masses. He is a man who never courts a constituency.

Judge Fleming, of Louisville, said a few days ago in an interview: "All that remains for our party is to continue true to our principles; to make those principles clear and clean cut, so that there can be no mistaking them; to do the patriotic work of the minority in Congress bravely and well, and in 1892, to select from the Northwest the best-known exponents of Democratic principles as our standard bearers. Emphasize always the idea that honesty and straight-forwardness is the best policy in politics as in everything else, and, if we do not have we will at least deserve success. This course will sooner or later bring into close political alliance the West and South, which sections are already one in interest make us independent of the trading factions of New York, and finally give us a victory that will be as glorious as it will be lasting."

Such a policy is bound to result in disaster, if not commercial ruin, but as the great States of the Union have just refused to sustain a good Administration, there is little hope that they will rebuke a bad one. Let every Democrat stand by his his colors. We will see what we will see.—Louisville Times.

Roger Q. Mills is disappointed, but not discouraged, at the National Democratic disaster. He attributes the defeat of Cleveland in New York to the knitting of him by Hill and Grant. He is particularly sore over the evidence of trading off of the electoral ticket.
