Russia has declined, pending the war with Japan, to enter upon negotiations with Great Britain for the settlement of questions at issue between the two countries.

W. J. Bryan has given out another statement in regard to the national Democratic platform. On the whole, he says, the platform is good and is worthy of the support of the party.

The report that the Japanese lost 30,000 men at Port Arthur on July 10 or 11 is officially denied by the imperial headquarters staff at Tokio. It is stated that not a shot was fired on either date.

Strong pressure is being brought to bear on Sen. A. P. Gorman to accept the chairmanship of the National Democratic Committee. Senator Gorman, it is said, does not want the place, but already decided in any event to take an active part in the campaign. Former Senator Davis, the Democratic nominee for Vice President, is said to be strongly in favor of Mr. Gorman for the chairmanship.

In an opinion given to Superintendent of Public Instruction Fiqua, Attorney General Hays holds that the common school fund of the State is entitled to its proportionate part of funds and taxes paid into the Insurance Department which appropriation has not been made since 1893. Something like \$150,000 is involved, and proceedings will be instituted to compel Auditor Hager to make the appropriation.

It has been suggested that our road overseers have usually made the mistake of calling out more men at one time than they can use to advantage on one piece of road. It was also suggested that in calling out hands the overseer should estimate the number he can use and keep directly "under his eye" on the particular piece of road to be worked. The man who made these suggestions lives out in the country district of Lawrence County. He says he has seen men strung out along a mile or two of road and but a few of those out of sight of the overseer doing any work.

The State College of Kentucky, LEXINGTON, KENTUCKY.

The Agricultural and Mechanical (State College) of Kentucky offers the following courses of study, viz: Agricultural, horticultural, chemical, biological, mathematical, physical, normal school, classical, mechanical engineering, electrical engineering, civil engineering, each of which extends over four years and leads to a degree. Post graduate studies are also provided, leading to a master's degree. Each course of study is organized under a separate faculty. The general faculty numbers nearly fifty professors and instructors.

County appointees receive tuition, room rent in dormitories, fuel and light, and if they remain ten months, traveling expenses. The laboratories and museums are large, well equipped, comprehensive and modern.

The legislature appropriated \$60,000 for a college home for young women and \$20,000 for drill hall and gymnasium for men. Both buildings are completed and in use. Military tactics and science are fully provided for as required by Congress.

Graduates from the several courses of study readily find excellent positions and liberal remuneration. The demand is largely in excess of the ability of the college to supply. Last year the matriculation was 750.

Specialists with the necessary number of assistants have charge of each department of natural science. Summer schools are provided for pedagogy, engineering and instruction in science.
