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Ceylon Has Rare Exhibit

"The Eden of Eastern Wave" Well Represented at the St. Louis Exposition.

One of the most picturesque pavilions in the World's Fair grounds is that erected by the government of Ceylon. Externally, it is a reproduction of the famous Buddhist "Temple of the Tooth" at Kandy, in the center of the island, where a traditional relic of the great oriental teacher has been enshrined for many hundreds of years and to this day draws devotees from all parts of Asia. Internally, the building is adapted for a display of Ceylon's commercial products, artistic manufactures, and ethnological and archaeological curios.

The broad and cool verandas are a favorite place of resort, for here fragrant tea is served by deft-fingered and softly-moving Chinese waiters.

tobacco, coconut fiber and coconut products, the highest priced rubber on the world's markets, gems, pearls from the Straits of Mannar, tortoise shell, sponges, plumbago for the manufacture of pencils and lead pencils, also for lubricating purposes and for certain processes in electroplating, are all valuable exports, and are fully illustrated by samples both in the Ceylon pavilion at St. Louis and also in her special court within the Palace of Agriculture.

In the latter section there is much of interest to be seen by every observant visitor. For example, the lesson to be learned from the thorough utilization of the coconut palm is one that may be taken to heart by all who

shared in their picturesque native life. The women are dressed in white robes, crimson sash, and tortoise-shell comb to confine the flowing tresses. But the slighter, younger, and more refined, should not depart without a visit to the upper balcony of the building, where he will find himself transported to the orient, bookshelves of objects of rare beauty of the most fascinating interest, wandering about a spell in the beautiful island that offers him so many a new and interesting "Eastern Wave."

But the coconut palm in Ceylon is made to yield quite as full a profit. The leaves of the palm are used for roofing, the ribs of the leaves for brooms, the coarse outer fiber of the nut for matting and cordage, the inner fiber for the stuffing of mattresses. The flesh of the nut supplies a natural food, and, desiccated and shredded, a favoring for confectionery; its milk is a delicious fresh beverage, its extracted oil forms a valuable material for soap and candle making, the residuum from the oil press goes to the fattening of cattle, while the refined oil makes an excellent substitute for lard for cooking purposes, and the refined lard a cooking butter for table use. The toddy, or milk drawn from the tree stem, is distilled into arrack, a potent spirit, or turned into vinegar; its sugar, obtained by evaporation, forms a sweetmeat; the husk or "calash" at the apex of the stem makes an excellent vegetable, and is often pickled; the best of the shells are carved for ornament, or converted into cooking utensils, while the others are burned as fuel, smokeless and giving a good charcoal; even the blossom in its long sheath is utilized as a torch, the trunk affords rafters, beams, troughs, canoes

and cradles; the sawn timber supplies tables, chairs, and virtually all the furniture of a comfortable home; while the roots again help to keep the forest alive. In the east or in the west, no more perfect illustration is afforded of a commercial "clean up." That the profits of coconut farming are great, let the following table of exports from last year's return bear eloquent testimony:

Coconut oil, 665,387 cwt.
Copra (dried coconut), 721,875 cwt.
Peanut (feed for cattle), 239,972 cwt.
Coff (the fiber), 244,965 cwt.
Desiccated coconut, 485,269 lbs.
Arrack, 72,619 gallons.
Nuts (on nature), 12,129,349.
And all this was in addition to the supplies utilized on the island itself.

For Farmers.

Twenty-one cars of cattle from the State of Washington were on the Chicago market one day recently. They were wintered on alfalfa and finished on grass and were good enough to bring \$5 per hundred. There is something in this item for beef producers.

Let the careless farmer charge himself with the profits he might have made on every young thing that dies and he will soon convince himself that he cannot afford to allow anything to die from the lack of attention.—Ex.

Cure For Mad Dog Bite.

A correspondent writes that about six years ago he saw an item in a newspaper stating that a German physician was going to die, and he wished to make known, the discovery he had made in relation to the treatment of a mad dog bite. The prescription he never knew to fail, and he had tried it many times with men, cattle and horses. It is this: Simply wash the wound as soon as possible in a little warm vinegar and water, and put a few drops of muriatic acid into the wound. This will neutralize the poison and prevent the disease which usually proves fatal.—Boston Journal.

The News is for temperance, for total abstinence, if you will, but it also believes in tempering zeal with discretion and prohibition with practicability.
