The local option election held at Maysville last Tuesday, was the most exciting ever held there and resulted in a decided victory for the "wets" by a majority of 248, they carrying every ward in the city save the Sixth.

The case of the Commonwealth against James Hargis, charged with the murder of James Cockrill, was placed on trial Tuesday in the Fayette county Circuit Court and adjourned until Friday, that a special venire of 800 men, from which to select a jury, might be summoned. Five hundred out of twenty-four summoned in Fayette county qualified for service as jurors.

The convention that is to nominate candidates for Circuit Judge and Commonwealth's Attorney in this district will be held June 22nd. The judge's race is made up of two Elliott county gentlemen, but up to this time no one has announced for the office of Commonwealth's Attorney.
