

OUR WEST VIRGINIA NEIGHBORS.

The secretary of Sunday School Convention was requested to have published the following resolution which was unanimously adopted at its last session.

"Resolved that each church in this Association instruct its messengers to the Association to be held at Fort Gay October 9th and 10th as to how much it would help in employing a missionary to work in destitute parts of the Associations." It is to be hoped that each Church will contribute freely as the State Board will bear half the expense. There was a considerable wreck on the Big Sandy, East Lynn and Guyan Railroad on the 5th inst. Four cars were derailed and the track torn up for some distance. No one was hurt. Within the past two weeks there were over 4,000 ties shipped from the tie yards at this place, and they can hardly be missed from the yards.

The last uniform examination for the year 1907 was held throughout the State on last Friday and Saturday. The examination for Wayne county was held at Wayne, and there were twenty four teachers who made application to the examiners for certificates. Eight of these twenty four however, withdrew before the examination was over, leaving sixteen, only, who may be granted certificates.

Deputy Sheriff John S. Billups came over from Cassville Monday to convey to the State Reform School at Pruntytown three boys sentenced to serve time at that institution at the last term of the Circuit Court. The boys convicted were Wade Thornhill, Crit Thornhill, and Robert Dillon, and the offense for which they will pay the penalty at Pruntytown was breaking and entering an N. & W. freight car at a station on the Sandy division.

Mrs. Mary Drew is in possession of perhaps the oldest gourd in the State of Kentucky, says the Mayfield Messenger. It grew in Scotland in 1611, and has been used for a powder gourd ever since. It will hold exactly one pound of powder. Mrs. Drew was a Miss Morgan, and is a sister of Willis Morgan of Paducah, and they are descendants of the Scotch-Irish family of over three centuries ago. This gourd has been in the possession of the Morgan family for 296 years, and as slick as glass. It has been handed down from generation to generation, until it is now in the possession of Mrs. Drew, who before she married Mr. Drew was the widow of C. W. T. Egner, who was born and reared at Egner's Ferry, in Marshall county.

A SOLDIER'S MISTAKE.

Charged the Enemy When He Thought He Was Fleeing to Rear.

"When the first call came for troops in 1861," said a member of a Grand Army post, "I heard of it at the village post office in my town, and turning around to a man I had known since boyhood, I said:

"Well, Jim, shall we go?" "Sure," he replied, and 24 hours later we were off. Jim was my comrade and bunkie for three years, and came home to be kicked in the stomach by a male. After we had been in service two years we were having a scrap with the enemy one day, when all of a sudden Jim jumps out of the ranks and goes charging down on 3,000 men all alone. He was yelled at to come back, but he didn't seem to hear. Some of us got the idea that an order had been given to advance, and we took after Jim, and in a minute the whole regiment was charging. It was such an unexpected move that the enemy broke and staggered back, and Jim was made a sergeant for his bravery.

"He had been home a year when he died. I was called to his bedside when he knew that he was going. The other folks all left the room at his order, and then he said to me: "Tom, do you remember that time I charged 3,000 men all by myself?" "Of course, and it was a brave thing to do." "Nothing of the kind, Tom. Do you know why I did it?" "Out of bravery." "That's all guff. I was scared out of my boots that day and bolted, and the fun of the thing was that I got all turned around and bolted towards the enemy instead of our rear. Tom, I'm going to my long home, and I want you to kneel down in the tater patch to-morrow and tell the Lord just how it was."

MONUMENT OF POPE LEO XIII.

Erected in Rome by Cardinals Created by Him.

Rome.—The monument of Pope Leo XIII., erected in the Basilica of St. John Lateran at the expense of the cardinals created during his pontificate, "ab eo creati," is the work of the Roman sculptor, Prof. Giulio Tadolini.

It is situated in a niche in the left transept over the door leading to the sacristy. The figure of the pontiff is in a standing attitude, just rising from the sedia gestatoria, in the act of blessing. The pope's right arm is raised on high, while with his left hand he leans heavily on the chair. The two lateral figures in white marble represent a pilgrim workman

and the Church. The latter is symbolized by a woman bowed down in grief. Her right arm flung across the sarcophagus is meant to express sorrow at the pope's death, while the cross in her left hand represents Christianity.

The figure of the Church rests her foot on the terrestrial globe. The inscription underneath reads as follows: "Ecclesia ingenuit complante orbe universo."

The figure of the pilgrim is shown in a laborer's blouse. He holds a pair of rosary beads in his right hand and on his knees implores the pope's blessing. The following is the inscription: "Ad patrem illi ex omni regione veneraturi conveniunt."

The center of the monument consists of a sarcophagus of verd antique or green porphyry with decorations in gilt bronze and the plain inscription "Leo XIII." The entire monument rests on a sober architrave of granite adorned with the pontiff's coat of arms and two festoons in bronze that run across the whole front.
