Whereas, the required number of voters and more (to-wit 72) residents are citizens of the Town of Blaine, Lawrence county, Ky., a town of the sixth class and Justice's district No. 4, having been filed on the 3rd day of March, 1911, it is therefore ordered that a graded Common School District be and is hereby proposed to be established in the said Town of Blaine Lawrence county Ky. the boundary of which is as follows, including all the present sub-district bounded as follows, including all the present sub-district and including the farm of J. B. Fraley and that part of Henry Sparks farm lying on the south-side of Blaine Creek; also the farm of Bazell Potter.

The said petition having been endorsed by Matthew Bates, the trustee of the sub-district, and Jay O'Daniel, County Superintendent of Lawrence County, and it is ordered that John H. Carter, Sheriff of Lawrence County, be and he is directed to open a poll and hold an election in said proposed Graded Common School District on sixth day of May, 1911, in the Town of Blaine, Lawrence county, Ky., at the regular voting place in said town for the purpose of taking the sense of the legal white voters in said proposed graded Common School district upon the proposition whether or not they will vote an annual tax of fifty cents (50c) on each white male citizen and 40 cents on each \$100 worth of taxable property ad valorem within the said proposed graded Common school district for the purpose of maintaining a graded common school district in said proposed district.
