The attention of our readers is called to the cut of Kentucky on page 2. It is of interest to all who will take part in the Democratic primary election.

Henry Bosworth is one of the cleanest and highest class gentlemen in the State. He is the kind of a citizen who will ever be named. The office of Auditor is important and needs just such a man.

The friends and supporters of Senator Thomas H. Paynter have been quietly organizing Lexington and Fayette county for him, and it is conceded that he has a decided lead over Congressman Ollie James here and that he will carry both the city and county by a decisive majority in the coming primary.

Every Eastern Kentucky Democrat should go to the polls on Saturday of next week—July 1st—and vote for Senator Paynter. He is the only U. S. Senator this end of the State has ever had. Every vote counts one in this primary, it doesn't matter in what county or precinct you live. Go to the polls.

The Hon. J. Proctor Knott, Governor of Kentucky from 1852 to 1857, and five times a Representative of this State in Congress, died in Lebanon Sunday after a long illness. The funeral was held Tuesday afternoon. Governor Knott was one of a class of statesmen now almost gone. He was of the school of Back, Breckenridge, and McCleary, an intellectual giant, and incorruptible man. If she had lived until the 29th of next August he would have been 81 years old.

Henry M. Bosworth is the most popular candidate for Auditor on the Democratic ticket. In addition to all the qualifications that could be desired he is remembered as the man who sought out and arrested Caleb Powers as he was passing through Lexington in disguise on his way to his home in the mountains of southeastern Kentucky. Powers was dressed as a soldier and was under the protection of a company of the partisan State Guard of militia. He had Taylor's pardon in his pocket and was fully armed. This occurred just after the assassination of Goebel and while the excitement was at highest pitch. Bosworth was Sheriff of Fayette county and he "took his life in his hands" in entering the train and forcibly dragging Powers off. Democrats will never forget him for this brave deed.
