Burke McClure Kills Two: Is Himself Slain.

Burke McClure, age about 50 years, who was well known throughout this section, was shot and killed by a posse of officers under the leadership of Sheriff Don Chaffin at about 3 o'clock Sunday morning at Oceana, Wyoming county, while he had just after killing his wife and Mrs. Gertrude Johnson at his former home about a mile above Christian, an Elk creek, Friday morning.—Logan Democrat.

Circuit Court Disposes Of Important Cases.


