CONFERENCE MEETS NEXT WEDNESDAY

ANNUAL GATHERING TO BE HELD IN LOUISA FROM SEPTEMBER 5TH TO 10TH.

The annual session of the Western Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South will convene in the new church building at Louisa next Wednesday morning, September 5, Bishop McCoy presiding.

The ministers and delegates will nearly all arrive Tuesday, mostly on the N. & W. and the 1:25 p. m. C. & O. On Tuesday night Rev. G. W. Twyman, of New Martinsville, will preach at 7:30 each afternoon thereafter there will be preaching. On Sunday the pulpits of all other churches will probably be filled by some of the visiting ministers.

On Wednesday night will be celebrated the anniversary of the Board of Missions and Dr. E. H. Rawlings will speak. Thursday night Bishop McCoy will speak, the occasion being the Educational anniversary. Friday night will be Epworth League occasion and Dr. R. T. Brown will be the speaker.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE AT RICHARDSON

CLINT WALLACE'S HOME AND STORE CONSUMED IN FORTY-FIVE MINUTES.

Clint Wallace, of Richardson, this county, lost his residence and store by fire last Saturday. The loss is estimated at \$5,000, with insurance amounting to \$4000. \$1000 of this was on the residence and \$3000 on the store.

The fire occurred soon after noon. It caught from the kitchen flue and the roof was almost ready to fall in before it was discovered. In 45 minutes the two buildings were reduced to ashes. Nothing was saved from the residence. About \$1000 worth of merchandise was carried out of the store.

Mr. Wallace works at Peach Orchard, three miles away and his wife was in charge of the store when the fire took place. Mr. Wallace is a good citizen and has many friends who sympathize with him in his loss.

PRESIDENT REJECTS POPE'S PEACE PLANS

TERRIFIC ARRAIGNMENT OF THE KAISER, WHOSE PROMISES CAN NOT BE TRUSTED.

The following is a part of President Wilson's remarkable reply to the Pope's peace proposal: "Every heart that has not been blinded and hardened by this terrible war must be touched by this moving appeal of His Holiness, the Pope, must feel the dignity and force of the human and generous motives which prompted it, and most fervently wish that we might take the path of peace he so persuasively points out. But it would be folly to take it if it does not in fact lead to the goal he proposes. Our responses must be based upon the stern facts and upon nothing else. It is not a mere cessation of arms he desires; it is a stable and enduring peace. This agency must not be gone through with again and it must be a matter of every sober judgment what will insure us against it.

"His Holiness in substance proposes that we return to status quo ante bellum and that then there be a general condemnation, disarmament, and a concert of nations, based upon an acceptance of the principle of arbitration; that by similar concert, freedom of the seas be established; and that the territorial claims of France and Italy, the perplexing problems of the Balkan states, and the restitution of Poland be left to such conciliatory adjustments as may be possible in the new temper of such a peace, due regard being paid to the aspirations of the peoples whose political fortunes and affiliations will be involved.

MILITARY NEWSPAPERS

Washington, August 26.—Earl Adams Clark of Fountain City, Ind., and Indianapolis, has been chosen by Secretary of War Baker to take charge of the publication of a military service paper at the Louisville cantonment. A similar paper is to be published at each of the other 15 cantonments. The publication will include army orders and official bulletins of all kinds bearing on the military movement and also local items of special interest to the troopers at the Louisville cantonment.

PRESIDENT REJECTS POPE'S PEACE PLANS

TERRIFIC ARRAIGNMENT OF THE KAISER, WHOSE PROMISES CAN NOT BE TRUSTED.

The following is a part of President Wilson's remarkable reply to the Pope's peace proposal: "Every heart that has not been blinded and hardened by this terrible war must be touched by this moving appeal of His Holiness, the Pope, must feel the dignity and force of the human and generous motives which prompted it, and most fervently wish that we might take the path of peace he so persuasively points out. But it would be folly to take it if it does not in fact lead to the goal he proposes. Our responses must be based upon the stern facts and upon nothing else. It is not a mere cessation of arms he desires; it is a stable and enduring peace. This agency must not be gone through with again and it must be a matter of every sober judgment what will insure us against it.

"His Holiness in substance proposes that we return to status quo ante bellum and that then there be a general condemnation, disarmament, and a concert of nations, based upon an acceptance of the principle of arbitration; that by similar concert, freedom of the seas be established; and that the territorial claims of France and Italy, the perplexing problems of the Balkan states, and the restitution of Poland be left to such conciliatory adjustments as may be possible in the new temper of such a peace, due regard being paid to the aspirations of the peoples whose political fortunes and affiliations will be involved.

MILITARY NEWSPAPERS

Washington, August 26.—Earl Adams Clark of Fountain City, Ind., and Indianapolis, has been chosen by Secretary of War Baker to take charge of the publication of a military service paper at the Louisville cantonment. A similar paper is to be published at each of the other 15 cantonments. The publication will include army orders and official bulletins of all kinds bearing on the military movement and also local items of special interest to the troopers at the Louisville cantonment.
