## WEST VIRGINIA ITEMS OF NEWS

### Moundsville to Get Huge Smelter.

Wheeling, W. Va.—Moundsville, at the southern edge of the Wheeling industrial district, will within the next year have in full operation the largest zinc smelting plant in the world, was the announcement of President Charles M. Schwab of the United States Zinc Corporation. The present plant at Moundsville will be greatly enlarged. The Moundsville board of trade is making preparations for the erection of hundreds of dwelling houses for the incoming workers.

### James S. Albert Dead.

Mr. James S. Albert died in Williamson Monday. He had been a long sufferer from tuberculosis. He leaves a wife and two children. The deceased was about 35 years of age.

### Logan's Red Cross Record.

Figures compiled in connection with the third Red Cross roll call disclosed the fact that the miners of the Logan field have given generously to the Red Cross, 5,121 people in Logan county being back of the Red Cross in its peace time work, as compared with only 1,689 enrolled in the 1918 roll call. The executive secretary of the Logan county home service section is Miss Margaret Bottom, and under her supervision an average of 102 families a month have been assisted.

### Fire at Kenova.

Severe damage was inflicted by fire which broke out in the plant of the Tri-State Wholesale Grocery Company, Kenova, at 6:45 o'clock Friday evening. Loss from fire and water, though difficult to estimate, will not be less than \$25,000 and this is fully covered by insurance. Prompt and efficient action on the part of the Kenova fire department was supplemented by aid sent from Huntington and Catlettsburg departments and the blaze was extinguished.
