It is reported in the daily press that ten big battleships and six large cruisers are to be built by the United States within the next three years.

RACE EQUALITY FIGHT AGAIN THREATENS OHIO

Columbus, Ohio, November 16.—Announcement from Cleveland of the election to a lawmaker's seat of Harry E. Davis, Cleveland negro lawyer, came as a shock to-day to Republican leaders.

The reason for lack of joy in political circles is the far-advanced revival of the negro issue, which was made acute last year by the Davis bill to exempt all holders of public places, under heavy penalties to grant full equality to members of the negro race.

CONGRESSMAN FIELDS ADVANCED IN CONGRESS

Washington, Nov. 5.—Three Kentucky Democratic Congressmen will receive important advancements on House committees as a result of the election. Two of them will become ranking minority members of important committees.

By the defeat in the primary of Thetus W. Sims, Tennessee, ranking Democratic member of the Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee, and Frank E. Doremus, Michigan, second member on the committee.

Representative William J. Fields, Ninth Kentucky District, will become ranking minority member of the Military Affairs Committee as a result of the defeat in the primary of Representative Dent, Alabama.

COX TO RECEIVE KENTUCKY'S 13 VOTES

Frankfort, Nov. 16.—With returns from only fourteen counties missing, it appears that every Democratic Presidential elector will have a safe majority and that the State's vote will not be split.

The counties out are Daviess and McLean, in the Second District; Logan, in the Third; Marion and Meade, in the Fourth; Powell in the Seventh; Madison, Mercer and Shelby, in the Eighth; Elliott and Fleming, in the Ninth and Clinton and Wayne, in the Eleventh.

STATE REDEEMS \$1,345,000 OF VIRGINIA DEBT BONDS
