**L. A. Garred Replies to Article of "Honest Voter"**

In last week's issue of the Big Sandy News there appeared an article signed by an "Honest Voter," in which he not only gave you a lot of useless advice but set out several things which he said the county could well afford to be without, among which was our County Farm Agent. I am answering that article, believing it my duty as a citizen of our county and as President of the Lawrence County Farm Bureau, an honorable organization, and in charge of the County Agent work in the county.

First, I want to say as one man and voter of Lawrence county I have always studied the candidates and tried to base my opinion and vote for the best interest of the whole county. There have been mistakes prior to the one spoken of in his article in electing our county officers, especially county judges. However, at present our people have become more progressive and the majority are striving to build better roads through voting bonds, the only possible way, and I want to advise all voters that you not only think before voting but that you be sure you are casting your vote for a man who was not against our bond issue, is not against it now, and will not be against a good road program in the future.

If I understand the writer it was his desire to attack the citizens of our county seat. I wish to say I love Louisa, it is OUR town, I respect it as our county seat, admire the business men of the town; still I am a farmer and live on the farm, yet I believe the citizens of Louisa are more progressive and are making a greater effort to have good roads than are the people of the country who need them most. Mr. "Honest Voter," be thoughtful in the future and do not attempt to fight any progressive element of our county.

With reference to the office of Engineer, how are we to be without them, who will advise us when we need those TRACTORS, establish a grade on which we can drive them and direct our entire system of road building?

Now, with reference to our County Farm Agent I want to say there may have been a time in the history of Lawrence county when it was popular for a candidate to announce himself as against such "parasites" but the writer wishes to assert that that time has long since past. Because it has been shown to us that he is a valuable man and serving a good cause. There are those of us who well remember our deplorable condition for seed corn in the spring of 1918, and how efficiently our Farm Agent came to our rescue and in spite of the fact that only a few farmers had a grain of seed corn that would sprout, our crop was held up to normal. There are also scores of us who recall that every year we had to place hundreds of dollars on the loss side of the ledger as toll taken by Black Leg among our cattle, which today through the ceaseless efforts of our Farm Agent has been completely wiped out.

He asks if you are acquainted with our Farm Agent or know anything he has done for your benefit. I will say here that if the "Honest Voter" does not know his Farm Agent it is his fault, just as true as is the adage, "you can lead a horse to water but you can not make him drink."

He will remember the hundreds of us who appreciate our Farm Agent's assistance in placing nice Pure Bred Poland China hogs on our farms and the enjoyment as well as the economic pleasure we have gotten from them. If he will investigate fully, and if the beaming joys to overflowing from the eyes of the Club boys and girls of our county are any testimony he will have no trouble in being convinced.

Would you suppose for a minute that scores of us would look out on our farms today and see those big flocks of pure bred Rhode Island Red chickens without a feeling of gratitude for our Farm Agent who is largely directly responsible for our having them, because he made it so easy for us to secure them.

There are also those of us farmers who through his efforts are getting the services of Registrar of Merit, better fat tested sires that is having its undisputed effect on the upbuilding of our livestock industry as well as weekly cash returns in our pocket book. Look for a moment if you will

at the cream shippers increase in the past two years. In the spring of 1919 there were about 20 cans of cream shipped from Lawrence county per week. Today there are 115 cans being shipped per week.

The "Honest Voter" also tells you that our Farm Agent cost the county \$1200 or more per year, which is untrue as is evidenced by the record of the Lawrence County Farm Bureau we secured for him for this year a salary of \$1000 out of which he pays \$120 per year for rent on the Farm Bureau office and in maintaining a public rest room for the women and girls of our county, which leaves him only \$880 the cost to Lawrence county. Besides on investigation in the clerk's office it is found that according to the listed valuation of the "Honest Voter" his part of our Farm Agent's cost is probably a little less than a one cent postage stamp per year.

Not only are the banks and business men of Louisa dependent for their success upon the agriculture of our county but the possibilities of County Judges during the term of office is also largely dependent upon the success or failure of our farmers, for if they fall where are the taxes coming from and where are the possibilities of road development, the building of school houses and all other improvement which demands money. The "Honest Voter" as well as any other hasty individual should weigh carefully his statements before making any such public accusations or carelessly broadcasting any such dangerous advice.

The writer has not attempted to set forth all the good things which have been accomplished by our Farm Agent but merely to give you some idea as to how many of us feel towards him and to correct such false and erroneous mistakes made by one who is not in a position to formulate our ideas for you and does not have your best interest at heart.


