GALVIN TRIAL TO BE IN OCTOBER

Frankfort, Ky., Sept. 23.—Maurice Galvin, Republican leader, whom Gov-

ernor Morrow said prevailed upon him to grant a pardon for Frank Blair,

noted convict, who immediately left the State and escaped capture by Federal authorities, will be tried in Frank-

lin Circuit Court probably the first week in October by a special judge.

At a conference in court yesterday following Mr. Galvin's arraignment and plea of not guilty, Commonwealth's Attorney Victor A. Bradley told Mr. Galvin's attorneys that he would be glad to accommodate them with a speedy trial, but that County Attorney

Faul Gaines is ill and he must conduct the entire business of the court alone, giving him little time to prepare a case against Mr. Galvin. Judge Stout agreed to extend the term one week and it was expected that a special judge would be named today.

Dunlap Bradley has returned from Yatesville where he has been visiting friends and relatives.




