## BRIEF NEWS

Important potash deposits have been found in Barcelona, Spain.

Prohibition enforcement throughout the United States has cost \$6,250,000.43 in the last fiscal year.

The Cuban administration has asked for a budget of approximately fifty-five million dollars.

The King and Queen of Italy are making a formal visit to all of Italy's recovered provinces.

Napoleon Buffalo-Head, a wealthy Indian of Oklahoma, has been fined \$1,000 for killing his wife.

The Chinese language will be taught at Harvard this year. Dr. Yuen Ren Chao is to have charge of the course.

The old Ford store, at Duxbury, Mass., said to have been the first department store in America, was burned last week.

A new trade school has been opened at Tirana, Albania, built largely with the donations of American school children.

On account of lack of finances, ex-Emperor William is said to have dismissed his head gardener and taken up the duties himself.

Archeologists at work in the ancient ruins of Ephesus have discovered a crypt believed to be the tomb of St. John the Evangelist.

Secretary Hoover has appointed Carl F. Green of New York to head the newly created specialties division of the Department of Commerce.

A campaign to suppress mirth in theaters aroused by jokes on prohibition is being planned by prohibition enforcement officers in New York.

Secretary Mellon has stated that the Federal expenditures for the current fiscal year will be kept within the agreed limit of \$4,034,000,000.

Jules J. Jusserand, French ambassador to the United States, is returning to his post at Washington, having sailed from France October 15.

Leonard Wood became Governor of the Philippine Islands on October 15. He was sworn in immediately upon his return to Manila from Japan.

Winter maneuvers of the combined Atlantic and Pacific fleets will take place in Panama Bay, February 4-13, under plans submitted to the Navy Department.

The village of Hamtraek, a manufacturing center and a separate municipality, wholly within the corporate limits of Detroit, is to re-incorporate as a city.

The city of Chicago has lost its \$10,000,000 libel suit brought against the Chicago Tribune upon the claim that the paper had printed false statements regarding the financial standing of the city, and thereby injured the city's credit.

John Wanamaker, of Philadelphia has donated funds for the erection of a Y. M. C. A. in Moscow, Russia, in memory of Sir George Williams, founder of the Y. M. C. A.

The finding of a drunken "possum on Walden's Ridge in East Tennessee, recently started an immediate search in the vicinity which resulted in locating a large still.

Charleston, S. C., suffered a loss of \$1,500,000 October 13, when fertilizer material and warehouses and wharfs of the Charleston Terminal Company were burned.

The New York Police Department has purchased ten steel jackets, said to be bullet proof, to be used in emergencies by members of the bomb, Italian, and loft squads.

Benjamin Trotsky, of Passaic, N. J., has been allowed to change his name to Benjamin Travers. He claimed the name Trotsky was a handicap to him in his business.

An agreement has been reached between the American Relief Administration and the Soviet government whereby food may be sent into Russia by relatives of the stricken people.

Captain Emmett Kilpatrick, American Red Cross worker, recently released from a Bolshevik prison in Russia, is expected to reach his home in Uniontown, Ala., this week.

The body of the unknown soldier killed in France which is to be buried at Arlington Cemetery with National honors on Armistice Day will be shipped from Havre, France, October 25.

Captain Amundsen has obtained the services of two Norwegian aviators, and will take two airplanes with him, when his ship leaves Seattle next May, in an effort to reach the North Pole.

King Albert of Belgium and Queen Elizabeth, who have been on a trip to French African provinces, left Morocco October 13 by airplane, with the intention of flying the entire distance to Brussels.

Joel and James Chestwood, twins, celebrated their ninetieth birthday recently at Leavenworth, Kan. They were born in North Carolina, have reared large families and are both actively engaged in farm work.

The Federal Highway bill as agreed on in conference last week carries appropriations which will make possible the employment of from three hundred thousand to three hundred and fifty thousand men.

The National Reform Association is to have a four-day convocation in Washington City, beginning October 26, the purpose of which will be to pray for the success of the International Conference on Disarmament.


The Columbian senate has ratified the treaty with the United States by which Columbia is to receive \$25,000,000 in settlement of all claims in connection with the acquisition by the United States of the Panama Canal route.

The Russian Soviet, under the Riga treaty, owes Poland twenty-five million gold rubles. Being unable to pay cash, it has offered to pay the amount in diamonds, which the Poles have agreed to accept only as security until the amount is paid.
