Letter From State Department of Education Listing it as Accredited School.

Department of Education Frankfort, Ky. January 2, 1922.

The Board of Education is continuing to list the Louisa High School as an accredited "A" class high school. I filed your course of study with them together with report of my investigations and the same has been accepted and the school will be continued as I indicated to you in my letter of December 22.

ORDINANCE

Ordinance passed by City Council of the city of Louisa on December 29, 1921.

Upon failure of the owners of property which abuts, borders, or is adjacent to the street improvement constructed by J. L. Richmond, Contractor, to pay cash in full of the cost of said street improvement, in accordance with the assessments heretofore made therefor, within thirty days after the levy thereof, and also the failure of such property owners to pay the equal one-tenth part of said assessment tax with interest thereon at the rate of six per cent per annum upon the entire tax, on or before January 1, 1922, then the City Attorney is hereby ordered and directed to institute suit in equity against said property owners, and all of them who fall in the respect aforesaid, and to hereby enforce the lien against said property, together with all unpaid installments, with interest at the said rate thereon to date of satisfaction thereon, and its cost expended.

The City Clerk is hereby directed to insert a copy of this order in each of the issues of the Big Sandy News and The Lawrence County Recorder, next following this meeting, up and until the issue of said paper next before February 1, 1922, so that the property owners affected may be fully advised of the law in this respect and the duty involving upon the city to institute said action in the collection of these amounts.
