Pate McKenzie Taken To Pen. Sheriff Grant Daniel and Deputy Sheriff Oscar Castle left Tuesday morning for Frankfort with Pate McKenzie who will enter upon his life sentence for the part he played in the fight with officers last August when U. He was tried last September and given a life sentence but appealed to the Court of Appeals for a new trial which was refused him a few weeks ago.

Her remains were taken to her old home on Barnett's creek for burial. Mrs. Collins was 53 years of age and had lived a christian life.

First Conviction Under New Law. County Judge Beecher Stapleton tried his first case under a new law passed by the recent Legislature and signed by the Governor, giving the County Judge, Police Judge or Magistrate a right to try cases of liquor violations. Heretofore no court but the Circuit Court had the right to dispose of these cases, the lower courts

only holding violators to the Circuit Court. Now these liquor cases can be disposed of by the lower courts.
