The Southwest Sentinel of Silver City publishes a very timely article urging that Silver City be selected as the place for holding the next Territorial Democratic Convention. Silver City is the leading and most progressive town in Southern New Mexico. Indeed it is one of the few incorporated towns in the entire territory. There are ample first-class accommodations for the entertainment of delegates and visitors, and our people, who will regard the selection of Silver City as a high compliment, will extend to them a cordial welcome. Certainly the Democrats from other localities will not be themselves politically homeless in this banner county of Democracy.

For some time past there has been a feeling of estrangement between the northern and southern portions of the territory, caused in a large measure by the impression that we in the south are generally if not systematically ignored. The intercourse and acquaintance which will be brought about by the visit of a large number of representative men from other sections, will tend to awaken a more cordial relation and greater harmony between them. The Republican territorial executive committee will meet here on the 26th, and we hope our Democratic friends will go there on better terms than they have in the past. The country is being Wannamakered and Edmundsized to perdition. Casting hypocrites and demagogues rule the hour.
