It is said that agents of John D. Rockefeller and the Standard Oil Company are engaged in buying up large tracts of land in the Chimney Rock section of Rutherford county and that already some 10,000 acres have been purchased. It is also said that several big sawmills will be established in the timber boundaries and that the chestnut oak will be converted into barrels to be shipped North and West for use in the oil regions.

### W. Duke Dead.

All that was mortal of Washington Duke was laid to rest at Durham, N. C., last Wednesday in the presence of 15,000 people. He was 85 years old and one of the best known men in the State. He founded the great tobacco house, now known as the American Tobacco Company, which has made him and others immensely rich. When the war closed he had 50 cents in money, but with plenty of energy he was soon on the road to wealth. In a few years his goods were in great demand all over the United States, and in a few more years were being sold the world over. First and last he has given one million dollars to Trinity College at Durham, and Methodists all over the State mourn the loss of this good man. He was married twice and leaves a large family and many descendants to mourn his loss. The floral offerings were probably the most profuse ever seen in the State. All business in Durham was practically suspended for the funeral. A special car from New York brought a number of prominent people for the funeral.
