**"I WILL CUT OFF MY HEAD BEFORE ENTERING U. S."**

General Ojeda, of Mexico, Issues Ultimatum in No Light Terms. Naco, April 10.—"I will cut off my head with my sword before surrendering or crossing to the United States."

This was the statement of General Ojeda today. With his ranks depleted by killed and wounded, he continued defiance of assaults from nearly 2,000 state troops besieging the Mexican border town of Naco, opposite here. There was no fighting during the night or early today, the state troops remaining at some distance. It was reported that last night large quantities of ammunition were received by the rebels. The constitutionalists wounded have been taken to Cananaca. No figures have been furnished.
