THE RESULT OF A NEGLECT OF DUTY.—The borough auditors of Chester Springs, Cambria county, have got themselves into a pack of trouble, through their own negligence. It seems, says the Johnstown Tribune, that their failure to comply with the law requiring them to publish the annual statement of receipts and expenditures of that district has induced some of the tax payers to enter suit against them, and the chances are that the fine which attaches to neglect of this nature will be imposed.

Judge Mayer is mentioned as a probable candidate for Supreme Judge. The Judge is certainly well qualified for the high office, but we would dislike to lose him as President Judge of this district.

The Proposed Poor House. From a candid survey of all the facts we could gather on the subject, we have come to the conclusion that Centre county had better continue without a poor house, or "Home for the Destitute," as the law euphemistically calls it. On the main question, the comfort and well being of that unfortunate class, for whose use and occupancy such Home would be erected, we fail to see how it could be an improvement on our present system of maintaining the indigent, while to the tax payers it would bring increased burdens without any increased benefits to the pauper class. These are allegations, not proofs; conclusions not reasons. They are the result however of considerable inquiry and thought. Next week we expect to give our views more at large.

On Saturday evening a meeting of the stockholders of the Millheim Cemetery will be held in the school house. Officers are to be elected, the annual settlement held, and other business transacted. We hope that our citizens will for once manifest enough interest in this matter to attend and to provide means and measures to put our city of the dead into something like decent condition. It is truly no honor to us as a town that our grave yard has a dilapidated fence, and that it is full of stone heaps, brush and other rubbish. It should not be thus; but it is a sin of negligence rather than a willful or positive wrong. Come then, all who have a relative or friend buried there, or who otherwise feel an interest in the matter, and show a willingness to do your duty.

The fact that printers are poor is fast becoming so generally known and so well established that it will soon amount to a "principal in law." True there are exceptions, but these, like angel's visits, are few and far between. Sad and incongruous as it often is, poor we are not one of the few exceptions, but belong to the "tremendous majority." We very often sorely need what a wicked world vulgarly calls money—but have none got. In extreme cases of distress we sometimes take up our worn pen and issue touching appeals to those precious few who may happen to be indebted to us for a couple of dimes or dollars, but the utter futility of trying to raise the wind by such means becomes most cruelly apparent by the answers received, of which the following is a sample.
