LONDON, May 27. The Standard's Vienna correspondent says: The Turkish Ministers of War and Finance have apparently tendered their resignations. The Sultan's decision is still pending.

The Mexican Border Troubles.

WASHINGTON, May 25.—Secretary McCrary and General Sherman and Ord had a long conference before Secretary Everts this morning on the subject of the Mexican raids on the Texas frontier. This question is now in the hands of the state department, and if it fails to induce the Mexican authorities to lend an active effort to protect the frontier, the policy of sending United States troops across the Rio Grande into Mexico in pursuit of raiders, as suggested by General Ord, will no doubt be adopted.

The Prospective Hanging at Pottsville.

POTTSVILLE, May 28.—The governor having issued the death warrant of Thomas Duffy today, to be hung on June 21, this swells the number of Molly Maguires to be executed on that day to six, the others being James Carroll, James Boyle, Hugh McGeehan, James Hoartry and Thomas Munley.

Three Negroes Lynched for the Murder of a Woman.

COLUMBIA, Ga., May 28.—Last Friday morning before daylight Mrs. C. C. Chambliss, of Stewart county, was murdered by three negroes. They fired the fences and shot her husband away from the house. The negroes proceeded to the house to rob it and were met by Mrs. Chambliss, aged eighteen years, armed with a gun. One of the negroes, Jerry Snead, took the gun from her and lodged its contents in her head, causing her death instantly.

The Began Kuklux Story.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—Gov. Nichols' course in ferreting out the truth of the Law assassination case in Louisiana has had a good effect here and will delay, if does not prevent, any letter being written by a member of the cabinet on that and kindred affairs, which, on close investigation, do not seem to be political troubles. The department of justice, for instance, was alarmed over the reported intimidation of John Dula, who telegraphed from New Orleans that he had been served with a writ of habeas corpus in the town of St. Francisville, La., and barely escape with his life.
