Democratic Delegate Election.

The Democratic voters of Centre county will meet at the regular places of holding the general election on SATURDAY THE 13TH DAY OF SEPTEMBER, 1877, to elect delegates to the Democratic County Convention.

The delegates elected at the above time will meet in the Court House at Bellefonte on TUESDAY, THE 18TH DAY OF SEPTEMBER, at 10 o'clock P. M.

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The Iowa Democrats held their state convention on last Wednesday. They propose Tilden for President in 1880, adopted a Greenback Anti-Specie Resumption Platform, and nominated a Mr. Irish for Governor.

The Republicans of Etowah, away down in the pine tree state of Blaine-Maine, are very wrathful over their fraudulent President. At a meeting the other day they "Resolved, that President Hayes is a traitor to his country and to his country and to his God."

The Democrats of Union county held their convention last week and nominated H. H. Mercer, for Prothonotary, John A. Gunday, for County Surveyor, and Lewis Bittling for Coroner.

In court, at Leavenworth, on Saturday, George C. Haldeman and James E. Young pleaded guilty to the charge of assault and battery upon J. M. W. Geist, editor of the New Era. They were sentenced to pay a fine of \$25 each and costs of prosecution.

Edward Hawthorne, aged 23, has been committed to jail, in Pittsburg, on charge of having three wives more than the law allows. This young man had better be elected to succeed Brigham Young.

Senator Morton, of Indiana, who was so sick that his recovery seemed impossible, is getting better.

FOUR MILLION PEOPLE DOOMED. Sixth of the Population of Southern India Certain to Perish from Famine.

LONDON, August 29.—The editor of the Madras Times, who is a member of the relief committee, writes, under date of August 1, as follows: "The population in Southern India more or less afflicted by famine numbers 24,000,000. In the most favorable circumstances at least one-sixth of the people will die. The famine is unacceptably greater than that was in Bengal. Twenty-three people in all died of starvation in Bengal. In Madras no camp of 3,000 rises morning after morning without leaving thirty corpses. In the interior the distress is most fearful. One gentleman passing down a valley in the Wynnad district, counted twenty-nine dead bodies on the road. A coffee planter, seeking shelter from the rain in a hut found six decomposing corpses in it. On any day and every day by mothers may be seen in the streets of Madras offering their children for sale, while the fondling portion of the poorhouse is full of infants, found by the police on the roads, deserted by their parents. Since the famine commenced 500,000 people have died of want and distress. The first big tragedy may be expected in Mysore. In that province, indeed, information has reached me from Bangalore of two cases of cannibalism already."

A \$1,900,000 Fire in Missouri. PARIS, Mo., Aug. 31.—A fire broke out about 1 o'clock this afternoon in the City Saloon, and spread rapidly on the east and south sides of the square until about ten o'clock, when it was extinguished. The fire consumed, including three hotels, the Post Office, telegraph and express offices. The loss is estimated at from \$1,000,000 to \$1,500,000.

Many families are without shelter, and several lives are reported to have been lost. It is said that a man named Taylor set fire to the City Saloon by pouring oil on the floor, and igniting it with the remark that he would "burn the d-d town." He was arrested and lodged in jail. There was but one fire engine in town, and the water gave out, leaving the city to the mercy of the flames.

THE FRENCH ELECTIONS.

The Republicans United—Disunion Among their Opponents.

PARIS, Aug. 31.—Le Temps, moderate Republican, gives the following particulars: "No second Republican candidate has appeared to contest one of the seats represented by the 365 who voted renunciation of the empire of the 16th of May. The Left will contest 165 other constituencies, and there are not more than five of these where they are not agreed on a single candidate. On the other hand, the disunion of the Right is remarkable. In eighty constituencies the official candidate is confronted by a rival conservative. The Left, too, are more advanced with their preparations, having only forty constituencies out of 538 still unprovided with candidates, whereas in at least 30 departments the list of official candidates is still unsettled."

Charged With Twenty-Seven Murders.

WHITING, Ala., August 24.—Today as a train was leaving Pensacola, the sheriff with a posse, boarded the cars to assist two Texas officers to arrest the notorious John Wesley Harden, who is said to have committed twenty-seven murders and other bloody deeds. Harden has been offered by a act of the legislature of Texas. His last murder in Texas was the killing of the sheriff of Comanche county. He has lived in Florida for several years under the name of John Swain. About twenty-six years were fired in making the arrest, and Harden's companion named Mann, who had a pistol in his hand was killed.

A Pittsburg paper announces the organization of a mysterious secret order called the Universal Brotherhood. It is composed of laborers, mechanics, farmers, lawyers, doctors, preachers, politicians, office-holders, bankers, bondholders and speculators averrily excluded. No man is admitted to membership who is not engaged in some active industry involving manual labor. The order already numbers thousands and will be organized in every ward in Pittsburg. Its object is to unite the laboring classes of every grade and profession in a common interest throughout the United States.

The case of Jack Kehoe, the Molle, will be heard by the Supreme Court at Pittsburg at the October term. The case of Hester, Tully and McHugh, of Columbia, and Thomas P. Fisher, of Carbon, all of which will also be considered. Warrants had been issued for the execution of Hester, Tully and McHugh on August 9 and Fisher on September 10. No warrant had been issued in Kehoe's case but sentence of death had been pronounced in the court of Schuykill county.

DEATH ON THE RAIL.—Roland Gardner, aged 21, on his return home last Thursday night from an unsuccessful trial for work, got off the second section of the express freight opposite his father's one mile above Graham siding, and being tired, sat on the front of the freight train. The third section of the freight train, about a mile and a half, struck him, causing his death.—Clinton Democrat.

COURT PROCEEDINGS.—In the way of Commonwealth business, the term of Court now in session in this place has been an extraordinary one. No less than sixty indictments have, to the time of going to press, been acted upon by the Grand Jury, covering all classes of offenses from the most trivial assault and battery case up to that of horse-stealing. Already five persons have been sentenced to the penitentiary, and the grand jury only knows how many more will be before the court closes. J. C. Wollenschlag, charged and found guilty of stealing money from the house of Wm. Fisher, at Unionville, was sentenced to one year and two months in the penitentiary. James and Charles Gallagher, convicted of having the stolen silverware of A. O. Furst in their possession, were sentenced as follows: James to three years and Charles two years in the penitentiary. John Delaney and Michael Murphy, charged with stealing, butchering and selling cattle belonging to the farmers in Marion and Walker townships, were sentenced, the former to two years and the latter to one year in the penitentiary. Stewart Walker, the notorious horse thief, plead guilty, and as yet has not been sentenced.—Bellefonte Watchman.
