Killed by Lightning. MEMPHIS, May 9.—Yesterday afternoon, while children were playing under a tree near Winona, Miss., lightning struck the tree and instantly killed Nannie and Willie Hamer, nine and seven years, and Mary Hightower, aged six.

The "Speculative" Insurance Condemned. MIFFLINBURG, May 6.—West Susquehanna Classis is a part of the Eastern Synod of the Reformed Church in the United States, and covers Snyder, Union and Centre counties, in Pennsylvania. At a late meeting of this body in Selinsgrove, Pa., the following resolutions were unanimously adopted: WHEREAS, Almost the whole territory of West Susquehanna Classis is covered by what is commonly known as "speculative" life insurance.

RESOLVED, That we regard this business as fraudulent and wrong in principle and as very demoralizing in its effects.

RESOLVED, That we hereby earnestly exhort all our people to discourage and shun this business as a great public evil, hurtful to the Church and to the State as well as to the individual.

RESOLVED, That our pastors try to secure the early publication of this action in the various county papers which circulate among their people.

HENRY SHAW, a Blair county man, took part in a game at a circus in Hollidaysburg, and lost \$500 by the operation.

A gray eagle measuring seven feet across the wings was recently wounded and captured by William Finley, of Westmoreland county.

It is expected that 2,000,000 tons of coal will be produced yearly in the newly opened bituminous region of Centre county.

ASSEMBLYMAN GEORGE H. WILLIAMS, the only colored man in the Ohio Legislature, has fallen heir to \$50,000 and will retire from business and politics and devote himself to a history that he is writing.

A wood pulp paper mill has been put in operation at Lock Haven which utilizes the slabs and edgings of the lumber mills. A heavy paper is manufactured, suitable for flour sacks, which is turned out at the rate of a car load a day.

Lizzie Devene, with the Barnum-London Circus, while performing the catapult act at Wilkesbarre on Tuesday evening fell upon the netting and struck her chin upon her knee, causing concussion of the spine. She has lost all power of motion and sensation of the lower limbs. Her recovery is doubtful.

Convicted of a Brutal Crime. WILMINGTON, Del., May 12.—The trial of William C. Guthrie for attempted rape was concluded this afternoon. A verdict of guilty was rendered, but sentence was deferred. The statute prescribes a penalty of thirty lashes, the pilory, a fine and imprisonment not exceeding ten years. Guthrie is about forty-five. His victim, Annie Bell Davidson, was eight and a half years old at the time. Both are white.

Arrested for Brute Outrage. LEBANON, Pa., May 12.—Charles Woomer, a married man, residing in the village of Myerstown, this county, was arrested at that place last night on a warrant issued by Squire Fasig, charging him with having committed rape on the fourteen-year-old daughter of John Howard, a resident of the same village. Woomer was brought to this place and lodged in jail.

Attacked by a Lion. ERIE, May 12.—During the street procession of Forepaugh's circus today there was a big scare and stampede because of an attack upon Mr. J. Forepaugh, who was seated in a cage between two lions. One of the savage beasts sprang, roaring at Forepaugh, who met the attack with a sharp pike, which he drove deep into the animal's mouth. A second spring was made, and again the pike saved the man from death. By dint of pluck and nerve the beast was brought into subjection again. Quite a number of minor accidents incidental to panics occurred. The tableau car, valued at \$31,000, was smashed by a freight train today.
