MANUFACTURE OF IRON. In another part of our columns to-day, we perceive that Mr. Lucas advertises a work which was sent to our table some time ago, but which in the more exciting topics of the past season, we have not afforded ourselves hitherto to omit noticing.

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FATAL ACCIDENT. During a democratic celebration at Frederick, Md., on Monday, Mr. Union Duval was instantly killed by the bursting of a cannon. The Examiner says, his body was thrown to the height of ten feet and fell at a distance of twenty-seven paces from the gun. The fragment which killed him, although 300 pounds in weight, was cast ninety-six paces and carried with it to the same spot, one of his legs which it cut off.

A BREACH OF PROMISE CASE. In the Supreme Court of New York, a decision has been given in an action for breach of promise, in which the court laid down the following points: First, that an action cannot be maintained for the breach of a conditional promise to marry—as that the defendant would marry the plaintiff, if he ever married any one. Such a promise is in effect an engagement in restraint of marriage. Under the circumstances of this case, it was held, that an absolute promise to marry had not been made out by the proof, and the verdict was set aside.
