The politicians of the South have made one vital mistake, a mistake which is now telling against them severely at Washington, and the consequences of which will pursue them for many a long day, as matters are progressing. We have taken occasion briefly to instance this...

In all the relations of private life he was justly esteemed. A kind, devoted husband and father, a constant and unchanging friend, he leaves a wide circle of appreciative admirers to lament his death.

His death is a severe and sudden loss to the country. The natural conclusion from all this could be none other than that the South had not yet cured of its errors and delusions, and although, under the circumstances, considering the terrible humiliations suffered by them, reasonable men might well excuse some of these manifestations springing from wounded pride and from defeat, yet it would have been better had they not done so. They have frankly acknowledged the frightful mistake made, and to have shown a thorough penitence for the wrongs committed. Beaten in the field, what supreme folly was it to thrust forward their military leaders, in many cases, as their political representatives; as if they were to transfer merely to transfer the fight from the field to the forum, and that had been expected from their old antagonists in Congress, but that these latter should shut the doors in their faces, and thereby call upon the people of the South to send up an entirely different class to represent them in the national councils, if they really wished for permanent peace, but which they have not.

In all this, we say, that they do not seem to have justified the action of the President, and it is unfortunate all around, that such is the case. It is the interest, and should be the wish of every loyal person in the country, to see the South recover as soon as possible from the evils and disabilities under which it is at present suffering, but which it has not yet cured of its errors and delusions, and although, under the circumstances, considering the terrible humiliations suffered by them, reasonable men might well excuse some of these manifestations springing from wounded pride and from defeat, yet it would have been better had they not done so. They have frankly acknowledged the frightful mistake made, and to have shown a thorough penitence for the wrongs committed. Beaten in the field, what supreme folly was it to thrust forward their military leaders, in many cases, as their political representatives; as if they were to transfer merely to transfer the fight from the field to the forum, and that had been expected from their old antagonists in Congress, but that these latter should shut the doors in their faces, and thereby call upon the people of the South to send up an entirely different class to represent them in the national councils, if they really wished for permanent peace, but which they have not.

And that this necessity begins to be recognized and truly appreciated, is, perhaps, no better shown than in North Carolina just now, and in the message of Governor Holden to the Legislature of that State. He says: "We can entertain no hope that confidence and activity in business will be revived, or that our people can ever begin to renew their former prosperity, until the State shall have been fully restored to her position as a Union. The greatest good of the present and of all coming generations, will be embodied in the practical fact that we are once more a part of the free, proud, and most prosperous Government in the world. As long as this fact is unrecognized, the State will be a mere shadow, and its people will be a mere prey to the hands of the great nations of the world. Instead of availing herself of her great natural advantages, and springing forward in competition with other States in the career of wealth and prosperity, she will become more and more impoverished. Let us, then, omit nothing which may be deemed necessary, or expedient, to attain the great end we have in view, to wit, the complete restoration of the State in all its constitutional relations to the common Government. Let the differences and divisions that exist among us, and which are calculated to obstruct the work of reconstruction, disappear under the influence of our united patriotism. Let us, whether by word or act, calculated to embarras the National Administration, incur a grave responsibility, and can be no friend either to the Federal Union or to North Carolina."

How could anything well imply more than that the old Government, as it has been contained in the policy and practice prevalent down South, and of which we have taken occasion to complain? Was it wise in the people and the politicians of the South to thrust forward men relied upon to compose difficulties, who had made themselves the most obnoxious to the nation, and continuing the late conflict? And last, not least, a sequence been—a most unfortunate one for the South, too—that the position of the President as their judicious friend and the champion of the Union also, has been seriously compromised, that those who bear him no good will have sought a chance to arraign and cast imputations upon his policy. It is too late now to correct all this, so as to save the South from the present consequences of its folly; but then, it is not too late to make the lesson effectual to the prevention of blunders in the same line in the future. Only the determination, once for all, to recognize the old Government as the mighty power, is a power it is idle to deny, or, at least, against, only the determination, once for all, to stand by it as the protector it may become to those who in good faith acknowledge its prerogatives, can relieve the South of the evils that now afflict it, evils which will distract upon its future, as to make the outside world, from going to its aid, and the Congress of the nation from trusting it. And if those who have hitherto assumed to be its leaders have any real regard for its welfare, they will make themselves—regard to reconstruction—as little conspicuous as possible. They may, many approaches, in good faith, to the South matters, to see the South restored. But they must realize fully that they are but damaging advocates; that the wisest thing they can at present do, is to maintain a "masterly inactivity," resigning to other men not obnoxious to the nation's censure the task of reconstruction.

GENERAL W. W. MORRIS. It becomes our painful duty to announce the death of one of the oldest and most valuable officers of the United States Army. Gen. W. W. Morris died at Fort McHenry on Monday last, after a long and painful illness, which he bore with the Roman fortitude so characteristic of his noble character. Although not entirely unexpected, the death of this excellent officer occurred suddenly at last, he having frequently rallied from depressed conditions of body apparently the most hopeless.

Gen. Morris graduated at West Point Military Academy, July, 1820, and entered the service as 2d Lieutenant in the 1st Cavalry. He served with distinction in the Florida and Mexican wars, and at a later period commanded at various posts upon the frontiers, always acquiring himself of his various trusts to the entire satisfaction of the Government. In November, 1861, he became Colonel of 2d U. S. Artillery, and in the succeeding year was made Brigadier General by brevet for meritorious services.

It is more especially by reason of his connection with the events of the late rebellion, as exhibited in Maryland, that General Morris will be long and favorably remembered by this community. Placed in command at Fort McHenry at the beginning of our troubles, he soon gave evidence of the most eminent qualities, and so well pleased was the Government with the wise and judicious administration of his duties, that, amid the oft recurring changes of officers in this military district, General Morris retained a position constantly exposed to no duties and responsibilities. As full commander of this department, in the absence of the regular officer, he always proved himself master of the situation. All will remember when the city was seriously threatened by rebel invasion, how calmly he provided for every emergency. The confidence reposed in him by the Government, and the success of his operations, were evidence of his high military talents.
