REPORT OF THE GRAND JURY

ON THE CONDITION OF THE JAIL.

FEBRUARY TERM, 1864.

To the Honorable JOHN H. PRICE, Judge of the Circuit Court for Harford county.

IN conformity with custom, the Grand Jurors for the February Term of the above named Court, have visited the County Jail, and do make to your Honor the following report, viz:

We find confined therein nine white men—five for theft, and four insane; three negroes—one for safe-keeping, one for theft, and one insane. Of the above, three white men have been tried during the present term of Court.

Everything relating to the duties of the Sheriff, appears to be conducted in as cleanly and efficient a manner as could be expected from any person, in consideration of the miserable construction and dilapidated condition of the building—for the want of proper ventilation and sundry repairs.

We feel it almost unnecessary to call the attention of your Honor to the above facts, as the matter has so often been brought to your notice by former juries, but a sense of duty seems to require us to impress upon your mind that the construction of the building and the condition of the apartments are such, that it is wholly inadequate, in any reasonable degree, to secure the comfort of the lunatics and keep in proper condition the other prisoners.

We do, therefore, most seriously appeal, in the name of humanity, that something may be done for the amelioration of their condition, by the proper authorities.

All of which is most respectfully submitted.

THE subscribers are now building a new Tread Power, one of their own improvement, which they have tested in connection with their combined Thresher and Cleaner, and would say to the public abroad, that they can now furnish a more complete Two-horse Power and Thresher, than has ever before been offered. The Power is so geared that it runs with a very slow step for the horses, and needs but little elevation to give motion to the Thresher and Cleaner.

The Power and Winnower is connected by one straight belt, running it as an Overshot Machine, making it an improvement over the Undershot one, by its not being so liable to carry through stones, sticks, &c., that may be gathered up with the grain. No other combined Thresher and Winnower is so simple, and easily put into operation. Its extreme width is 3 feet; length 11 feet; height 3 feet; and weighs about 800 pounds. The Thresh r, Rake, Separator and Winnower, are arranged in one strong frame, so that the machine is shipped in one piece, and moved when set for use without being taken apart.

The Revolving Rake is so arranged, that as the grain is fed and passed from the cylinder, it divides the straw from the grain and carries it through and over a Separator or Shaker, obviating a great difficulty that other Winnowers are liable to, in carrying over grain with the straw, which has heretofore been so much complained of.

With two medium sized horses or mules, they will both thresh and clean, and in such a manner that the common Fanning Mill is dispensed with entirely; two men and two boys will thresh and bag 150 to 175 bushels of wheat, or 300 bushels of oats per day, with ease.

There are two sizes of these machines. The large size, or No. 1, is generally run by lever power. Either of these machines can be run with any lever power. The No. 1 Machine, with 2 or 3 horses to a lever power, will thresh and bag 200 to 225 bushels of wheat per day, ready for market. These machines are warranted to give satisfaction.
