Fee Bill and Rules

Adopted by the undersigned Physicians of Harford County, Md., June 1, 1861.

Primary Visit, \$ c. 1 50

Subsequent Visits in attendance upon Fractures, Luxations, Amputations, and other Surgical cases, to be charged for at the same rates as in medical cases.

Fee from a Student for the whole course of reading, (3 years,) 150 00 to 200 00
1. The foregoing Fee Table is adopted as our guide,—under the impression that a STANDARD is necessary, as a mutual protection and convenience to the public and the profession.

2. Although we regard these charges as the rule, yet these rates may be increased, according to the judgment of the physician concerned, in all extraordinary cases, in proportion to the importance of the case, the responsibility attached to it, and the services rendered.

3. We will not make any deduction from our bills, except in those cases where the debtor is actually unable to pay the full amount.

4. It is not designed by these regulations to prevent gratuitous services to those who are incapable of making remunerations without distressing themselves or families.

5. We will not, upon any consideration, render our services to individuals or families by the year, or for any specified period, for a stipulated sum.

6. We consider that the payment for our services is due as soon as they are rendered; and when not paid at that time, we hold ourselves pledged to each other to present our accounts for settlement, (either personally or through a collector,) every six months, or at farthest, every year, as may be most convenient to ourselves and our patrons. And in those cases where the bills are not paid on presentation we will require notes of hand, as is customary in other business transactions.

7. We unqualifiedly adopt for our government the Code of Ethics of the American Medical Association.

8. In testimony of our approval of the above Fee Bill and Rules, we hereunto, on this first day of June, 1861, append our names, with the determination to practice, henceforth all their provisions.
