Maryland Coal Trade.—For the week ending Saturday, August 27th, 7,458,190 tons of coal were shipped over the Chesapeake and Pennsylvania Railroad, and 4,088,126 over the road of the George's Creek Coal and Iron Company. Making a total for the week from the entire region of 11,547,316 tons.

73 boats cleared this port during the week ending Wednesday, the 31st inst., carrying 9,145,195 tons of coal.

During the season 1871 boats cleared this port, carrying 24,750,000 tons of coal.

The Aurora Borealis.—From about twilight (Sunday) until far in the night the whole heavens, in this region, were lighted up with a most magnificent display of the Aurora Borealis, surpassing anything that has been witnessed for many years. It appeared as just above the horizon and looked as much like the reflection of a great fire. Shortly after it spread around to the east and nearly South, and then nearly over the entire horizon, partaking of a deep red color, with streaks of light shooting through it, illuminating the earth with a brightness equal to a full moon.

CAMP MEETING.—To-day the Camp Meeting of the Methodist Episcopal Church, of this county commences in Shriver's woods, about one mile East of Cumberland. Ample preparations have been made for the comfort, convenience and general accommodation of all who may desire to participate in the devotional exercises of the Camp. The place selected is an eligible piece of ground in a grove. The arrangements are liberal. The camp forms an oblong square, measuring longitudinally, three hundred feet, and laterally, one hundred and eighty-six feet. There are forty-eight tents within the square, the average size of which is about twelve by sixteen feet. There are 56 tents altogether. About three thousand persons can be comfortably seated with the present arrangements, and there is space sufficient to accommodate in any more with every thing necessary to turn it to advantage when required. The Revs. W. T. D. Clemm, of Baltimore, and J. Van Lanahan, of Alexandria, are expected to be present during the meeting, and assist in the duties of the camp.
