CONGRESS—SENATE.—The Senate after several days debate, by a vote of 22 to 32, laid Mr. Trumbull's amendment to Senator Mason's resolution on the table. The motion then to appoint a committee to inquire into the Harper's Ferry affair was passed unanimously. The committee consists of the following Senators: Mason, Davis, Colman, Fitch and Doolittle. Rev. Dr. Gurley, has been elected Chaplain.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.—The discussion growing out of Mr. Phelps's motion on Hodge's Book, is still progressing. Several ballots have been had for Speaker, Mr. Sherman's highest vote bringing him within four of an election. The democracy in Caucus have determined to adhere to Mr. Boocock until he shall think proper to withdraw. The Americans are resolutely determined not to vote for a democrat, considering the democracy more profligate, and less national than the republicans. The Republicans were unwaveringly for their candidate, Mr. Sherman. It also seems to be the fixed purpose of the members not to elect the Speaker by a plurality. One of the national representatives, and not so intolerably bigoted, they could, by uniting with the Americans, have elected Mr. Gilmer, of North Carolina, Speaker. Mr. H. A. De. J. of the House should, therefore, elect a Republican, the Democracy will have to bear the responsibility. The probability is that the House will not be organized until after the holidays.

6. It should be able to make the tenon greater or less, on both the under and upper threads, and with uniformity.
7. It should have a straight needle; curved ones are liable to break.
8. The needle should have perpendicular motion. This is absolutely necessary for heavy work.
9. It should be capable of taking in the largest pieces of work.
10. It should be able to bind with a binder, hem with a hemmer; should stitch, fell, run and gather.
