Local Intelligence. COURT PROCEEDINGS.—Jno. Barry v. Borden Mining Company. In the Circuit Court for Allegany county, Jan. term.

In this case the plaintiff sued the defendant for damages for turning him out of a lease of land, formed in the Spring of 1869, for the transportation of coal over the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal.

The trial of the case lasted some five days, during which a vast amount of testimony was taken, much of which was of a contradictory character. In the month of February last, C. P. Leo, G. Lynn, as agent for the Borden Mining Company, formed and put upon the Canal what was termed a line, consisting of 60 Canal Boats, which were to run regularly from Cumberland to Alexandria. The plaintiff was taken into the line by the defendant, and dismissed from the same some time in August last.

The plaintiff alleged and proved by evidence, direct and circumstantial, that he was taken into the line "for the season," but only for such time as the defendant should see proper to retain him in it. The whole question for the jury was, whether the plaintiff's boat was taken into the line for the season, or at the pleasure of the defendant. Upon this point the evidence was quite contradictory, if not irreconcilable.

Judgment for the plaintiff for \$414.50—\$100.00 for plaintiff's expenses for defendant.

The Canal we believe has suffered no other damage.
